The Globe of Monday contained an account of the Diamond Wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Gee, of Thorndale, from which the following is taken:

On the 25th of March the diamond wedding of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Gee was celebrated at the residence of their youngest daughter, Mrs. William Duffin, concession 3, West Nisour.

Mr. and Mrs. Gee were married at the home of the bride's parents, Mr. and Mrs. William Stark, Markham, Ontario, on March 25, 1863, by Rev. James Gordon of the Markham Presbyterian Church. Mrs. James Ross of Ilderton and John Lawson of Wilton Grove were guests at the first wedding, the golden wedding and the diamond wedding.

Mrs. Gee was born near Edinburgh, Scotland, 83 years ago, and moved with her parents to Markham, near Toronto, when 14 years of age. Mr. Gee was born in Wiltshire, England, 88 years ago, and moved to Scarborough when 20 years of age. Mr. and Mrs. Gee resided in Markham for five years, and then moved to their farm south of Thorndale, where they resided until a couple of years ago, when they took up their residence with a daughter a few miles distant.

Although this couple are almost nonagenarians, they take an active part in the games and interests of their grandchildren. Every summer Mrs. Gee takes her grandchildren out for one week's picnicking, providing all kinds of outdoor sports and amusements.

Mrs. Gee's favorite pastime is reading the newspapers. He has always been a staunch Reformer and studies every detail of political questions in The Globe, of which he has been a reader for over 60 years.
