Village Council

At a meeting of the Council on the 3rd of April communications were received from the Northern Ontario Fire Relief committee, from H. Cook re-increased electric power, and from W. A. Vanderburgh asking permission to remove certain trees in front of his lot on Yonge Street.

On motion Mr. Vanderburgh's request was granted, and Mr. Cook's letter was referred to the Electric Light Commission. The Clerk was instructed to reply to the Fire Relief letter.

The auditors' report was presented and passed, and the clerk was instructed to have 200 copies printed.

A number of accounts were ordered to be paid.

On motion it was decided to place insurance on the new rink to the amount of \$8,000.

A deputation from the Horticultural Society was present to interview the Council with reference to Black Knot, and the enforcement of the act in that regard. Also as to the advisability of the village purchasing a sprayer for general use of owners of fruit trees, and further to ask the Council if the Society might have permission to lay out the portion of the park west of the new rink as a beauty spot, and that the Council would have some necessary work done on the ground.

The Council asured the deputation that the Society would have its cooperation in every way possible.

Plans for an Arbor Day were discussed, and the date for the first collection of garbage for the year was set for the first Friday in May.
