

York County School Fairs

The School Fair outlook for 1923 is very favorable, judging by requests for seeds. Entries have been received from 120 schools, which indicates the popularity of the School Children's Fair. 4,800 special packages of garden seeds, flowers and grains and 350 doz. eggs will be delivered during the next two weeks. Twenty-six bags of potatoes of the Green Mountain variety will reach Newmarket for delivery during the early part of May.

It is hoped that special delivery of eggs can be made where possible to avoid any possibility of injury through shipping. Plans are being made to have the Secretaries of School Boards meet the Agricultural Representative at some central point in the township and decide on the place where the School Fair will be held.

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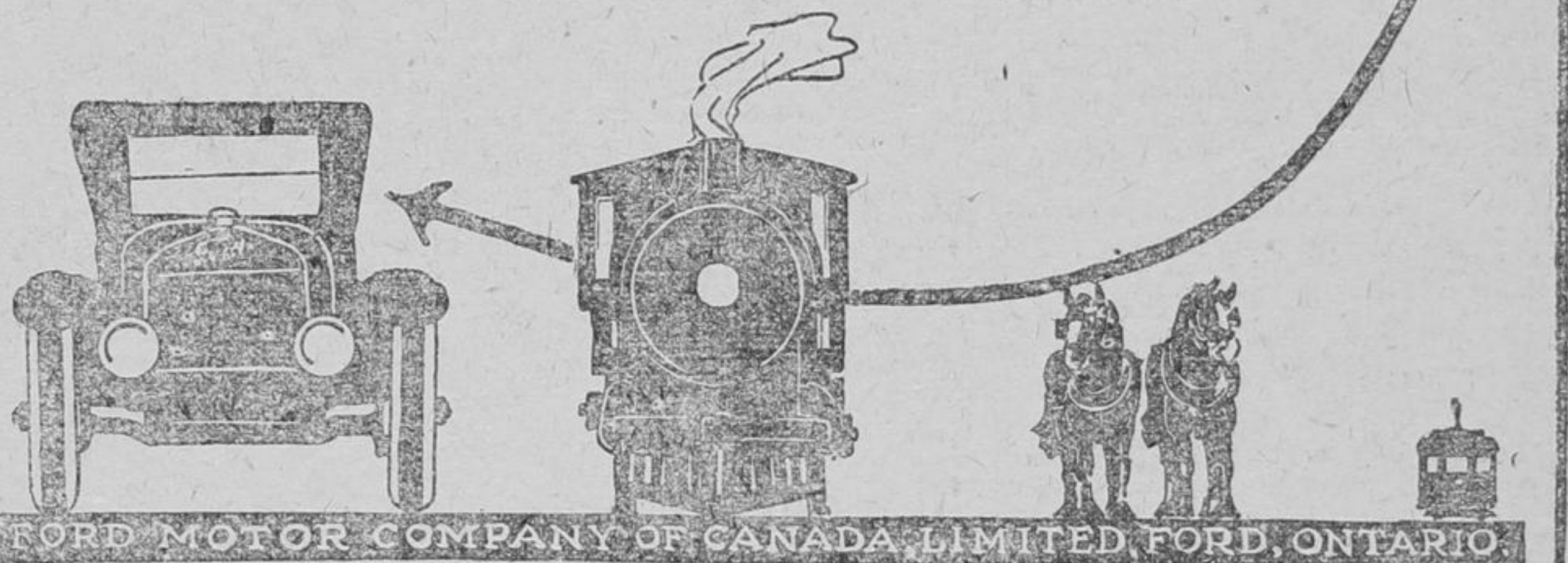
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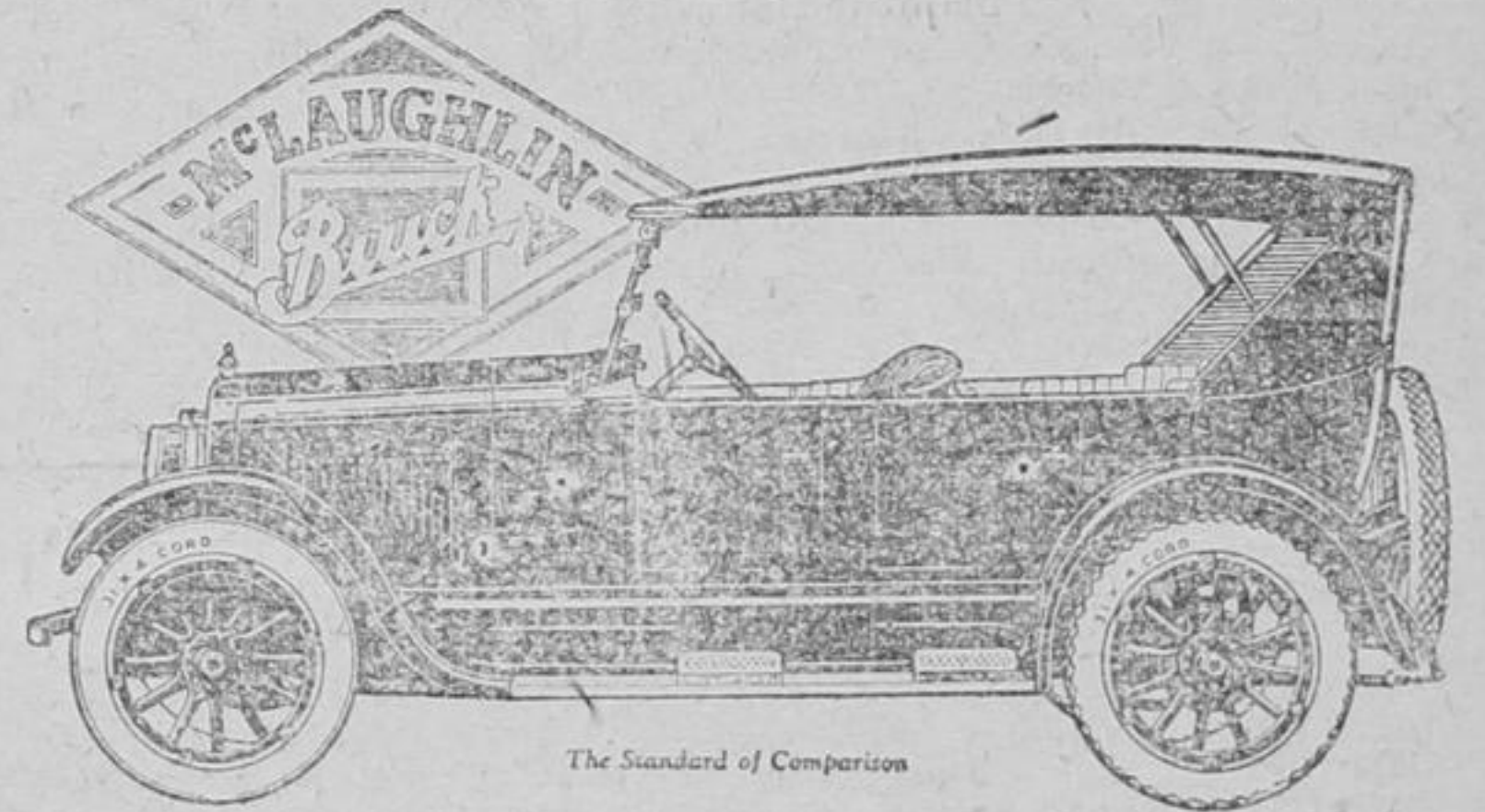
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
