Cadet-Lieut. Bernard White will have his Signallers there on the word "Move," and Cadet Harold Mahoney will demonstrate field messages.

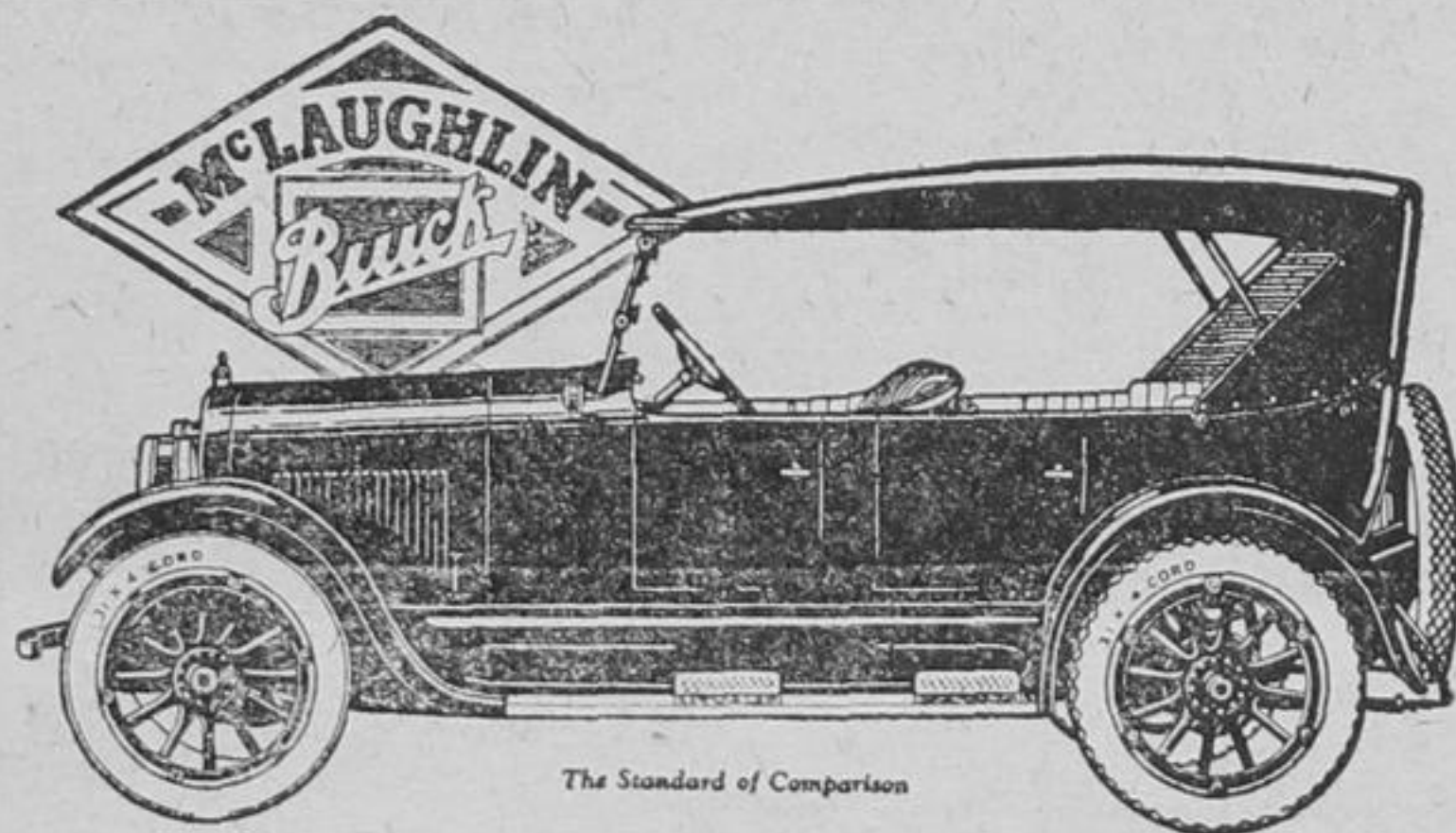
The following Cubs will act as Platoon leaders for the March Past: Cadets Lyle Grant, Enoch Baty, John McLean, and Frisby.

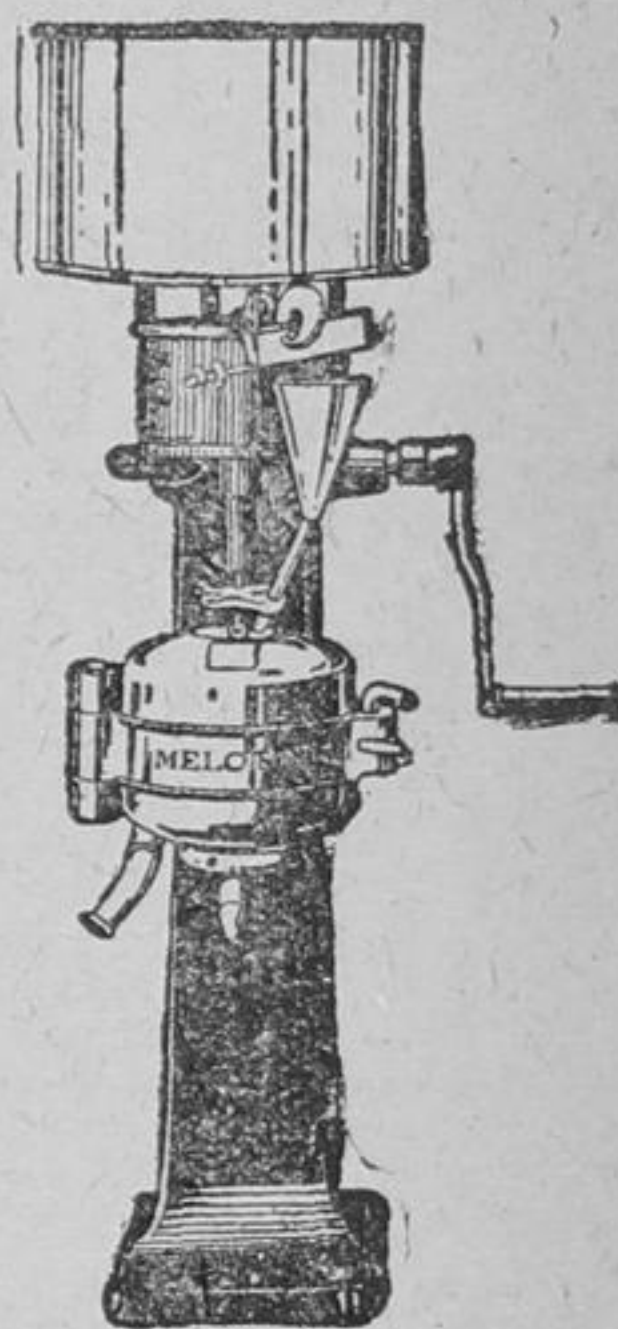
