Joseph W. Barnes Dead

We clip the following death notice from the Daily Register of Napa, Cal. Deceased was a brother of Mrs. John Woods of this place: Joseph W. Barnes, a prominent orchardist and rancher of Wooden Valley and well-known throughout Napa Co., breathed his last at a hospital in this city, Wednesday evening, August 15. Mr. Barnes had been critically ill for about four months, most of the time being confined to his bed. He was

first prostrated by rheumatism, which later affected his heart. His demise was due to a heart attack.

Deceased was a native of Detroit, Mich. He came to California 37 years ago and for a number of years engaged in the contracting business in San Francisco. Thence he went with his family to Cordelia, where he lived for 8 years. Later he purchased the Edington ranch of 135 acres in Wooden Valley, and it was in Wooden Valley that he resided continuously up to the time of his fatal illness.

He was an enterprising and progressive farmer and he developed the property in Wooden Valley extensively. It now embraces valuable orchard and vineyard lands.

Mr. Barnes took an interest in community work and was always active in political affairs.

Deceased is survived by a widow and three sons: Walter O. Barnes of Seattle; Norman R. Barnes of San Francisco; and Arnold A. Barnes of Wooden Valley. There are also two brothers: James E. and William Barnes of Detroit; and two sisters: Mrs. Thomas Ferguson of Detroit and Mrs. Eliza Woods of Richmond Hill, Ontario, Canada.

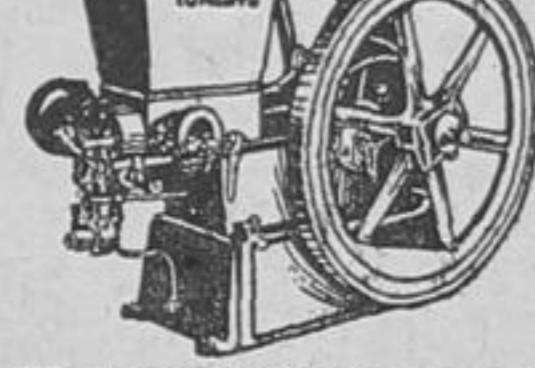
