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Brought Here for Burial

Mrs. Powell, widow of the late
William Powell, for many years a
resident of Richmond Hill, died at the
residence of her son-in-law and
daughter, Mr. and Mrs. H. Whittaker,
in Winnipeg. Accompanied by Mr.
and Mrs. Whittaker, the remains were
brought here for interment, having
arrived by C.N.R., Monday afternoon.
The casket was opened in the
cemetery, when many relatives and old
friends looked for the last time upon
the face of one whom they had loved
and esteemed. The service was con-
ducted by Rev. H. S. Warren, and at
the grave Mr. Whittaker, of Toronto,
gave a short address bearing on the
sterling qualities and beautiful character
of the deceased. The surviving child-
ren are John of Buffalo, Alfred of
Toronto, Percy of Calgary and Miss
Florence of Winnipeg.

Badly Burned

While trying to pull out their potato
laden truck and pass a buggy driven by
Ambrose Canning, a young lad, at
7 o'clock last Thursday night, on the
road running near the farm of John
Hodgen, a short distance south of
Jefferson, Kenneth Burt and Harrison
Telfer, both of Elmvale, backed too
far, and their truck overturned into
a ditch, taking fire and burning them
severely, as they lay pinned be-
neath. The two young men had snow
on their windshield, and failed to see
the approach of the buggy until it was
close upon them. Fortunately a radial
car happened along, and driver, con-
ductor and passengers immediately
rushed to the rescue, and pulled the
two men from beneath the truck,
which was soon reduced to its iron-
work. Miss Gamble and Miss Hodgen,
two nurses, also were quickly on the
scene, and after skilfully rendering
first-aid, had the patients placed in an
ambulance and rushed to Toronto
General Hospital. At the hospital it
was ascertained that Mr. Telfer had
both legs severely burned, and that his
condition was critical. Mr. Burt was
burned on the right foot, but his con-
dition was otherwise good.

FORMER EMSDALE CITIZEN DIES

**EZRA GRANT DIES AT RICHMOND
HILL, AND IS LAID TO REST WITH
MASONIC HONORS.**

The following account of the death of
Mr. Ezra Grant will appear in this
week's issue of the Huntsville Forester,
and has been forwarded to us for publi-
cation:

"A former citizen of Emsdale, Mr.
Ezra B. Grant, who for several years
conducted the Emsdale Hotel and who
was well known as a progressive type
of man, died at his home at Richmond
Hill on Wednesday afternoon, Novem-
ber 21st.

Mr. Grant was born in Camden town-
ship, Addington County, June 9th, 1853.
He moved from Napanee to Emsdale
almost thirty years ago. From there
he moved with his family to Sutton, and
eight years ago purchased the Hotel
Richmond at Richmond Hill, where he
has since resided.

While living at Emsdale he helped to
promote Masonry, and was one who
united with Emsdale craftsmen in the
institution of Algonquin Lodge, No
434, A.F. & A.M., being one of the
charter members. He was Master of
the Lodge some five years after its
formation, and is the first of the Past
Masters of Algonquin Lodge to be called
"from labor unto rest." He was also
a member of Malone Lodge, No.
512, Sutton, and of Newmarket Royal
Arch Chapter.

The funeral, at Richmond Hill on Fri-
day afternoon, was conducted by Rich-
mond Lodge, No. 23. Rev. J. W. Mc-
Intosh, minister of the Presbyterian
Church, of which body the deceased was
an adherent, read the Scriptures and
spoke briefly on the uncertainties of
life. The Masonic service was read by
R. W. Bro. W. H. Legge, and those
acting as pall-bearers were R. W. Bros.
J. H. Hunlop and H. A. Nicholls, W.
Bros. D. Hill, Geo. Cowie, T. H. Trench
(all of Richmond Lodge), and W. Bro.
Harry Linney, of Bracebridge, who
represented Algonquin Lodge. The body
was laid to rest in the family plot at
Queensville.

The funeral was largely attended,
many friends coming from distances.
The several members of the deceased's
family were all present, as well as his
brothers and sisters. Floral remem-
brances were many and beautiful,
among others being a wreath of roses
from the family; a sheaf of 'mums
from his four sisters, Mrs. Jael King
and Mrs. M. Aselstine of Sutton; Mrs.
John Smith of Queensville, and Mrs.
M. Phillips of Richmond Hill; a wreath
of 'mums and roses from Algonquin
Masonic Lodge, Emsdale; a wreath
