Short Courses in Agriculture

The short courses in Domestic Science and Agriculture conducted annually by the local branch of the Department of Agriculture will be held this year at Richmond Hill, during the month of January. This is the thirteenth consecutive year that these courses have been conducted in this county, and from present indications promises to be more than up to the standard.

The ladies course will consist of two weeks of Domestic Science dealing with the various phases of cooking, canning and other household work, followed by a two weeks course in Home Nursing. In these lectures such subjects will be dealt with as work in

the sick room, baby hygiene, first aid, etc.

The Agricultural Course which is probably more familiar, is based on practical subjects and gives in concise form the results of agricultural experimental work which are applicable to local farm conditions. Owing to the fact that the course is so central this year, many of the best herds of livestock will be available for judging work. Amongst the topics will be a study of Field Crops, and their many enemies; judging grain and seeds; poultry work including culling and killing; and farm conveniences.

Arrangements have been made for the following lecturers in addition to the Agricultural Representative and his Assistant, Miss Graydon, of the Department of Education, a graduate nurse of considerable experience will conduct the Home Nursing, while Miss Hamilton of the Department of Agriculture of Ottawa will again conduct the course on Domestic Science.

Mr. Present, Assistant vegetable specialist for Ontario will lecture on fruit and vegetable work, Dr. Ross, of Toronto, on veterinary work and Mr. Shields, a successful beekeeper of Peterboro will deal with beekeeping on the farm.

With a staff of this calibre no young

woman and farm boy who can get to Richmond Hill for these courses from January 7th, to February 1st, and a card to the Department of Agriculture at Newmarket will bring to you a complete outline of the course.
