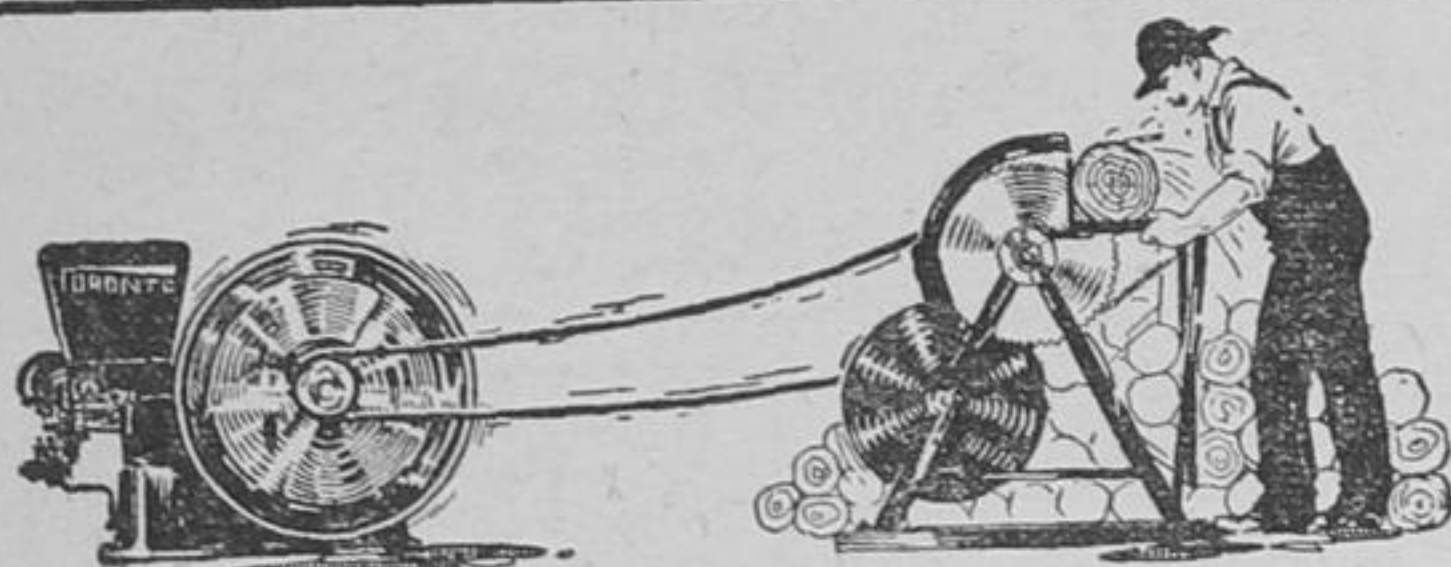

### Poultry Killing Demonstration

A novel feature which added to the success of the Pefferlaw, Mount Albert and Aurora Christmas Markets, was a killing and dressing competition, staged by the Department of Agriculture. Altogether at these three markets, upwards of 800 people were given the opportunity to witness Mr. H. H. Alp, B.S.A., a Poultry Specialist from the O.A.C. Guelph, kill and dress fowl along the latest lines. Following this demonstration a competition was held for amateur killers, and at each place the competition was well filled. The Christmas market committees supplied excellent prizes and large crowds looked on with great interest.

A similar contest will be held on the evening of January 9th, at Newmarket, during the North York Poultry Show. Educational films will be shown and Mr. J. J. Fraser of the Agricultural College will address the audience on poultry topics, after which a killing and dressing competition with excellent prizes, will be conducted. There is no entry fee and you will be expected to bring your own bird for killing, while knives etc., will be supplied.
