## Burned to Death

Mr. C. Barrow, Canadian National Railway section foreman at Washago, was burned to death in the wreck of a flanger near Parry Sound, when the flanger was struck by a fast freight in a blinding snowstorm. The flanger was thrown from the track and caught fire from the small stove with which it was heated, and while every effort was made to rescue Mr. Barrow, the attempts all failed. The remains were brought to Richmond Hill for burial. Deceased was a brother-in-law of Mrs. Reuben Horner of this village. Besides a brother he leaves to mourn his loss a wife and two children.

## Seed Fair

Farmers and all interested are reminded of the Seed Fair to be held in the Council Chamber, Saturday of this week. In each exhibit of grain and potatoes the exhibitor must show at least one bushel and have for sale at least 25 bushels, excepting beans, when 10 bushels will be required for sale. All grain and potatoes sold to be as good as sample shown. All entries to be made with the secretary before 12.30 on day of Fair. The public admitted at 2 p. m. Addresses will be given by Prof. Squirrel of the O. A. C., Lennox, Seed Commissioner; and McLennan, a vegetable specialist.

## Village Council

At a meeting of the Council on the 29th January the offer of Messrs Keenan & Walker, chartered accountants were accepted to audit the books in connection with the Village, including the school books for the sum of \$100.

The Board of Education handed in a requisition for \$12,000 for P. S. purposes and \$6,000 for the H. S.

By request of the Council the chairman of the Board of Education agreed to have the current requisition for school maintenance revised.

The Council met again Feb. 4. Tenders for hauling gravel were read from L. B. Stong, J. Sheardown, C. J. Mabley and R. A. Tyndall. Action on these tenders was deferred for the present.

Accounts to the amount of \$826.57 were passed and ordered to be paid.

A by-law was passed fixing the tax rate for the current year at 48 mills.

Mr. Lawrence addressed the Council on the subject of the advisability of annexing part of Markham Township to the village. The Council gave the matter favorable consideration, and

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on motion the By-Law Committee was instructed to obtain full information as to procedure and report at an early date. Mr. Lawrence also asked the Council to again consider the subject of draining on Ruggles Avenue, Baker Avenue and Markham Street, which the Council promised it would do.

## Young People's Society

Owing to the unfavorable condition of the weather and the roads, the drive arranged by the Young people of the Presbyterian Church for Monday night had to be called off. The members went instead, to the home of their Vice-President, Miss Batty, when they spent a most enjoyable evening in music and games. A feature of the programme was the presentation of a pretty boudoir lamp to Miss Agnes Sims, who has been a very active member of the Society. The address was read by the President, Allan MacNab, and the gift presented by Miss Madeleine Cooper and Miss Rose Robinson.

On Monday evening next, the members of the League of the Methodist Church are to visit the Young People's Society and engage in a friendly spelling match, and Geography contest. The meeting will be open to the public and everybody is invited.

F. McMahon.

Mr. Jarvis and Mr. Cameron were specially invited, as they are experts on high jumping horses, and the Society hope to add high jumping to their attractions at the next Fair. The classes will include light, middle and heavy weight hunters and jumpers. The young men were tendered a vote of thanks for the information and useful points given the members of the Executive.

After the business was transacted all present were entertained to an oyster supper by Mrs. Thompson. A vote of thanks to the Host and Hostess, on motion of Mr. Legge and Mr. Lunan, and a response by Mr. Thompson brought the meeting to a close.

The recommendations will be submitted at the next meeting of the Directors.
