AND WHEREAS by Revised Statutes of Onterio, 1914, Chapter 270, Section 75, the Trustees of the Separate School Board may pass a By-Law to borrow money and to issue debentures and to

give a mortgage; AND WHEREAS the site chosen by Trustees has been ratified by the ratepayers at a special meeting called for that purpose;

AND WHEREAS it is expedient to make the principal of the said debt repayable in yearly sums during the period of thirty years, such amounts, drinking poison liquor. respectively with the aggregate amount payable for principal and interest in any year, shall be equal as nearly as may be to the amount so payable for principal and interest in each of the other years;

AND WHEREAS it is necessary to raise annually the sum of \$550.44 during the reciod of thirty years to pay yearly sums of principal and interest as they become due,


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
