Protection has been abandoned by the Conservative party in England, but a plan for Imperial Preference has been retained. Stanley Baldwin has been re-elected leader of the Conservatives. After he had made to that early period when Japan was a short statement of the policy of beginning to open her doors to admit the party a resolution of confidence in him was proposed by Lord Balfour and supported by Austen Chamberlain. Mr. Baldwin said in the course of his statement that the idea of a protective tariff had been dropped from the Conservative policies in favor of imperial preference and x ensions of the tariff to safeguard tie industries act.

It is to be hoped that the troopers of t'e Royal Canadian Dragoons at Stan ey Barracks who severely whipped one of their number one night last week will not go unpunished. 
