Address on Grafting

There was a good audience in the

strated address on grafting fruit-trees.
With his pocket-knife and hand-saw
the professor demonstrated cleft
grafting, side-grafting, etc., and he
made his work so simple that even the

terested. Mr. Neilson pointed out
that, in grafting, care should be taken
to place the scion between the cambium—
which intervenes between the
last formed layers of wood—and the
bark. The professor was accorded a
hearty vote of thanks for his instruc-
tive address.
