

The Council met on May 5, 1924, in the Clerk's office, all the members present. Minutes of previous meetings read and confirmed.

Messrs Mylks and Cooper addressed the Council on behalf of the Loyal Orange District Lodge of Centre York, with a view to having an assurance that the Park Grounds and Buildings would be available for a demonstration would be available for a demonstration having a pie social at the home of Mrs. on July 12 next. The Council gave its George Wood, on Wednesday evening, assurance that the Park and Buildings would be at the Lodge's service as requested. The Village Building Inspector reported that Building permits to the value of \$255000 had been issued | Zion's Ev. Lutheran Church, Sherwood | 2 buttons medium heel. for the month of April.

A petition signed by L. Teetzel and 125 others was read asking the Council to proclaim daylight saving in Richmond Hill to coincide with Toronto dates for the same.

A requisition from the waterworks superintendent for meters and other material was read and on motion the Clerk was instructed to procure the material needed.

Major Blaney addressed the Council with a view to having needed improvements on the Richmond Street drainage, he offered to deepen the ditch in front of his own property provided the Council would continue the work to the proper outlet. The Council assured Major Blaney that this work was contemplated for the near future.

An application for electric power was read from Mr. J. F. Burr, and was laid over until next meeting of Council.

A request from the Salvation Army of Aurora, was read asking permission to hold a tag day on May 24th, was read. On motion permission was granted in as far as the Council had authority in the matter.

Letters from the American La France Co., and from Mr. W. A. Duncan, were read with reference to Fire trucks, the Clerk was instructed to write Mr. Duncan, asking for prices and full particulars of the apparatus specified in his letter. A communication from the Canadian

Des Moines Co., re painting the water tank was received, to which the Clerk was instructed to reply.

A deputation composed of Messrs Mills, Arnold and Dunlop addressed the Council with reference to the purchase of a Chemical Fire truck Mr. Mills stre-sed the possibility of damage to the Greenhouse industry as being much greater than would be involved by any other industry in case of fire, and the consequent greater necessity of a move effective means of fighting fire than we at present possess.

Mr. Arnold stated that there was little or no chance of getting water to his greenhouses and while he was paying taxes for fire protection he was not getting it, while a chemical engine, such as was advocated would give the protection needed. Mr. Dunlop pointed out that the greenhouse industry employed considerable labor and paid out a large amount of wages annually; he also stated his opinion that the importance of this industry to the Village deserved the consideration of the Council in the matter under discussion. The Council gave the deputation the assurance that every consideration would be given to the question.

A letter from the Hydro electric railway notifying the Council that the Railway schedule is according to Daylight Saving time, and asking for information as to the Council's intention as to making the change of time in Richmond Hill. The Clerk was instructed to reply to the effect that the
