SETTLE BY VOTE

The Village Council used good judgment Monday evening in acceding to the request of the 320 petitioners to adopt the so-called daylight saving time. It is true there was also a petition in favor of standard time, but the number of signers on the latter was less than one-third of those on the former.

It is scarcely right that this vexed question should come before the Council year after year. It would be far better to settle the question by a vote at the municipal elections in January.

LATE SPRING

Everybody is waiting for more sunshine. The new meadows are looking fine, coming through the winter in good shape, with less "heaving" than usual.

Fall wheat is also very promising, the crop in general being in excellent condition.

But spring crops are getting a poor start. The season is backward, and the heavy rains during the past two weeks are retarding work. It is safe to say that in the County of York, not more than half the grain is in the ground. However, with a week of fine weather and plenty of sunshine the farmers will still be hopeful.

Fruit growers have suffered very little direct loss from winter weather conditions, strawberries have come through the winter in excellent condition, and by pruning and spraying orchards, should give a good yield of first-class fruit.

THE WILL TO SAFETY

In a thoughtful address delivered before the recent Safety Convention in Toronto, Dr. H. J. Cody used a phrase that will linger in the minds of those who heard him. That phrase was "the will to safety." We have all heard of the "will o' power" and Dr. Cody's desire was to persuade both management and men to think safety and achieve it.

The reports received so far in 1924 by the Workmen's Compensation Board indicate that 18,710 accidents have been reported during the first four months of the year and that the total compensation awarded by the Board in the same period has been \$2,071,058.60. This is a very large

sum and, with the constant desire of everyone in the country to reduce costs, appears to offer a legitimate point of attack in the effort to reduce unnecessary expenses. The safety movement is largely educational in its methods and if, by intensive work in our industries, the will to safety can be developed, there will be fewer accidents.

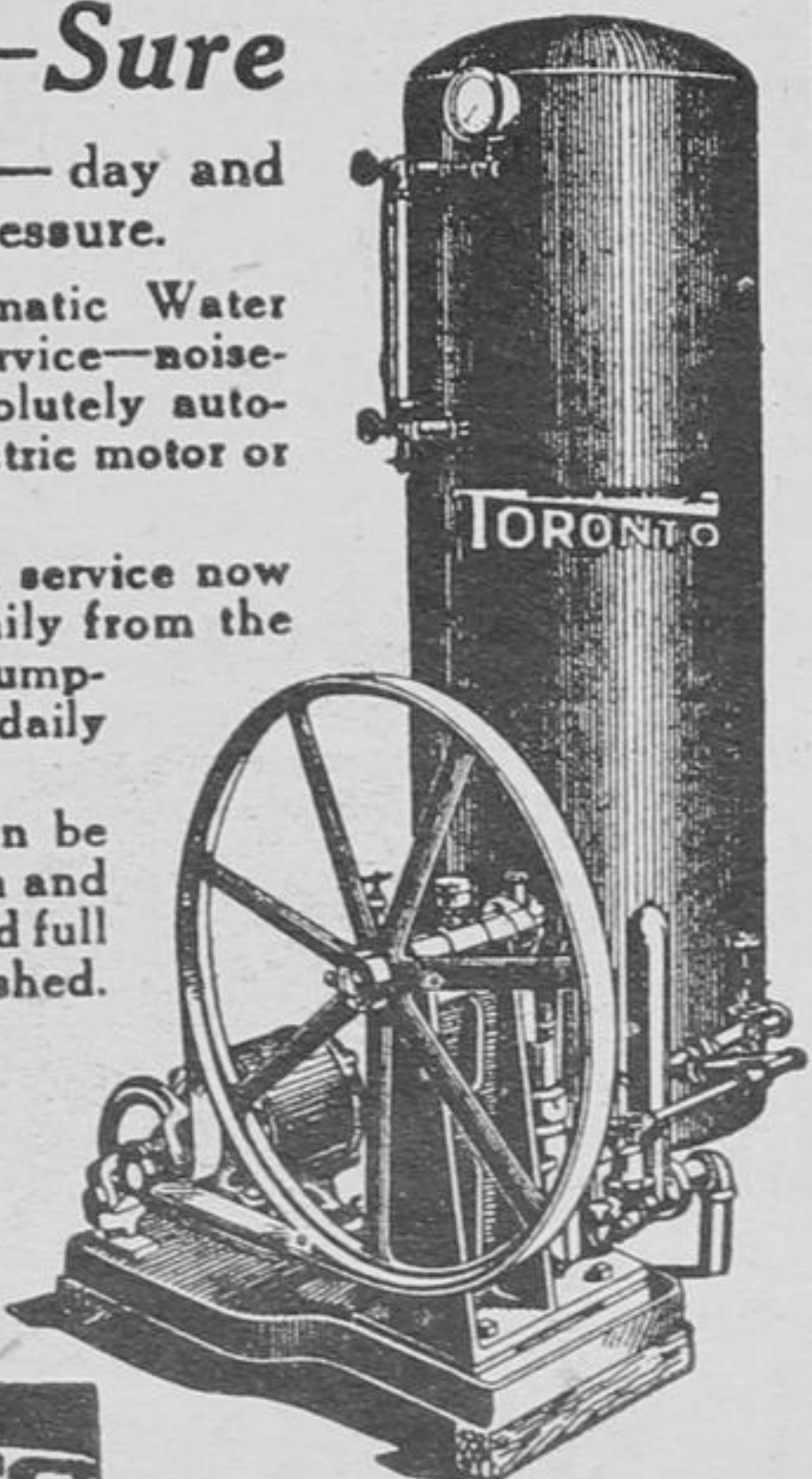

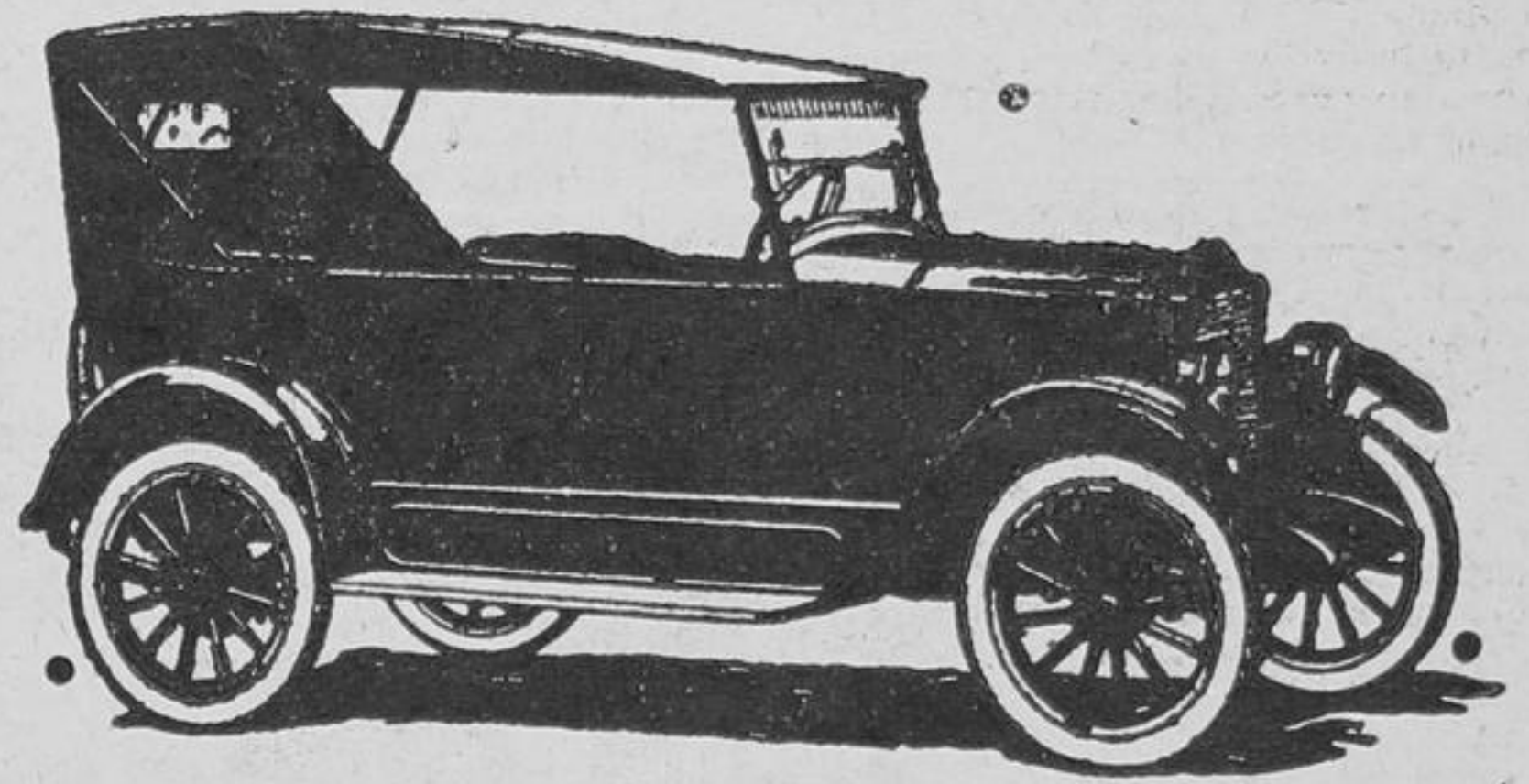

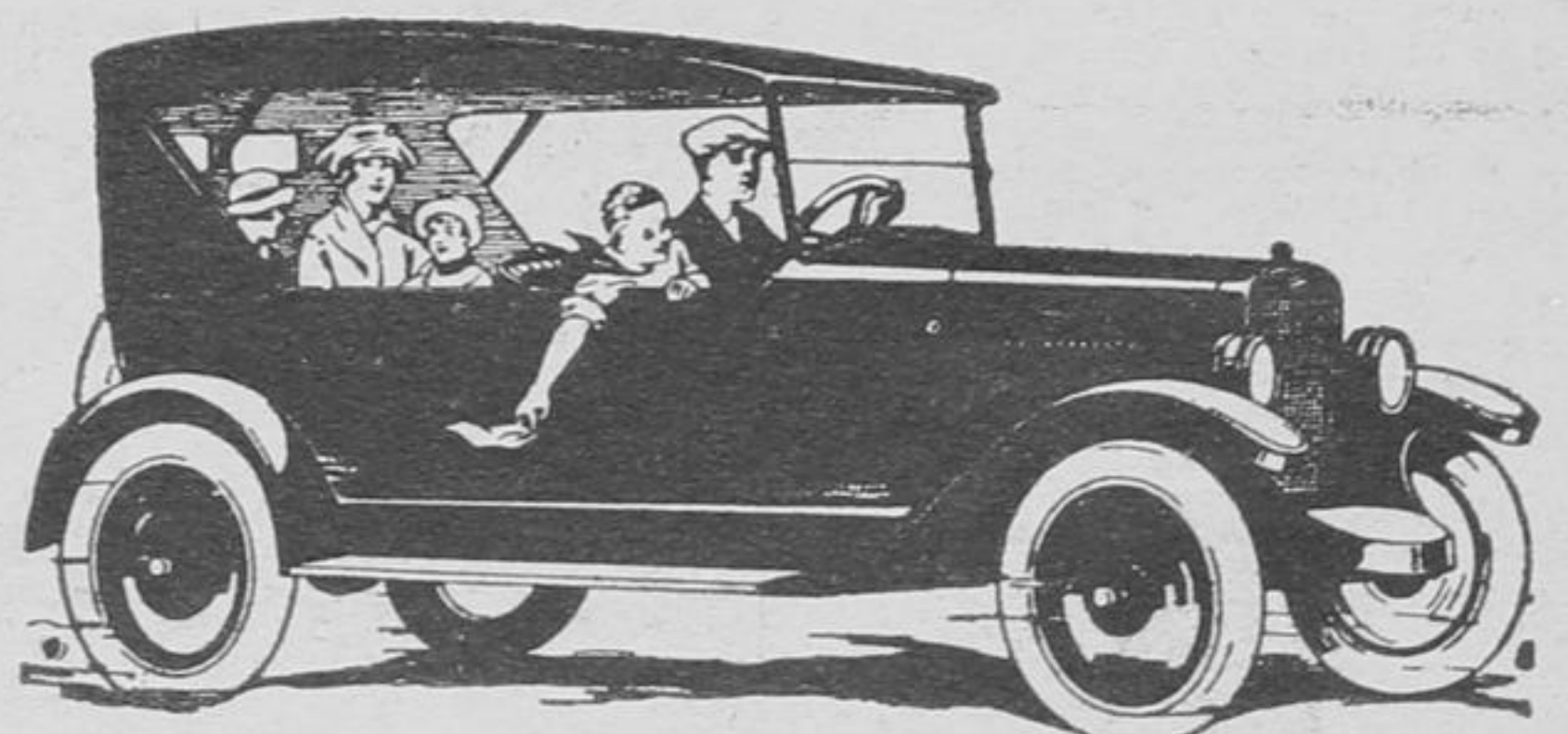
