### Horticultural Notes

The sprayer is making its second visit to the orchards of our members. Boys and girls of the Public School will receive seeds donated this week.

Mrs. R. B. M. Potts to whose address our members listened with keen enjoyment last week, has sent the following recipe for Tomato Blight, in response to a question asked at the meeting. "Tomatoes respond to phosphoric acid, and tomato blight can be cured, as it is a disease of the foliage, at the time of setting fruit and seed production, (the plant is giving all in this effort and consequently is suffering and starved.) If phosphoric acid is used it can be cured almost at once. A plant which is a heavy seed producer needs phosphoric acid. It needs nitrogen only in medium amount or it will go to leaf instead of fruit. The quantity of phosphoric acid or bone meal to use is two ounces to each square yard."
