SAFETY FIRST

It appears that, according to
Canadian law, if a motorist gives a
free ride to a person, and the latter
suffers an accident while being
driven in the car, the owner of the
auto will be liable for damages.

The Daily Star strongly objects to
the law, and contends that it should
be changed. It takes the ground
that the giving of a ride to another is
a friendly act, and argues that if a
person accepts a ride he should also
accept the risk.

It would certainly be a mean man
who would enter suit against another
who had befriended him, if the
casualty was purely accidental, but
if the accident is the result of
carelessness or reckless driving on
the part of the motorist, he should be
held responsible for the injury in-
flicted. Probably the law had
better be left as it is at present.

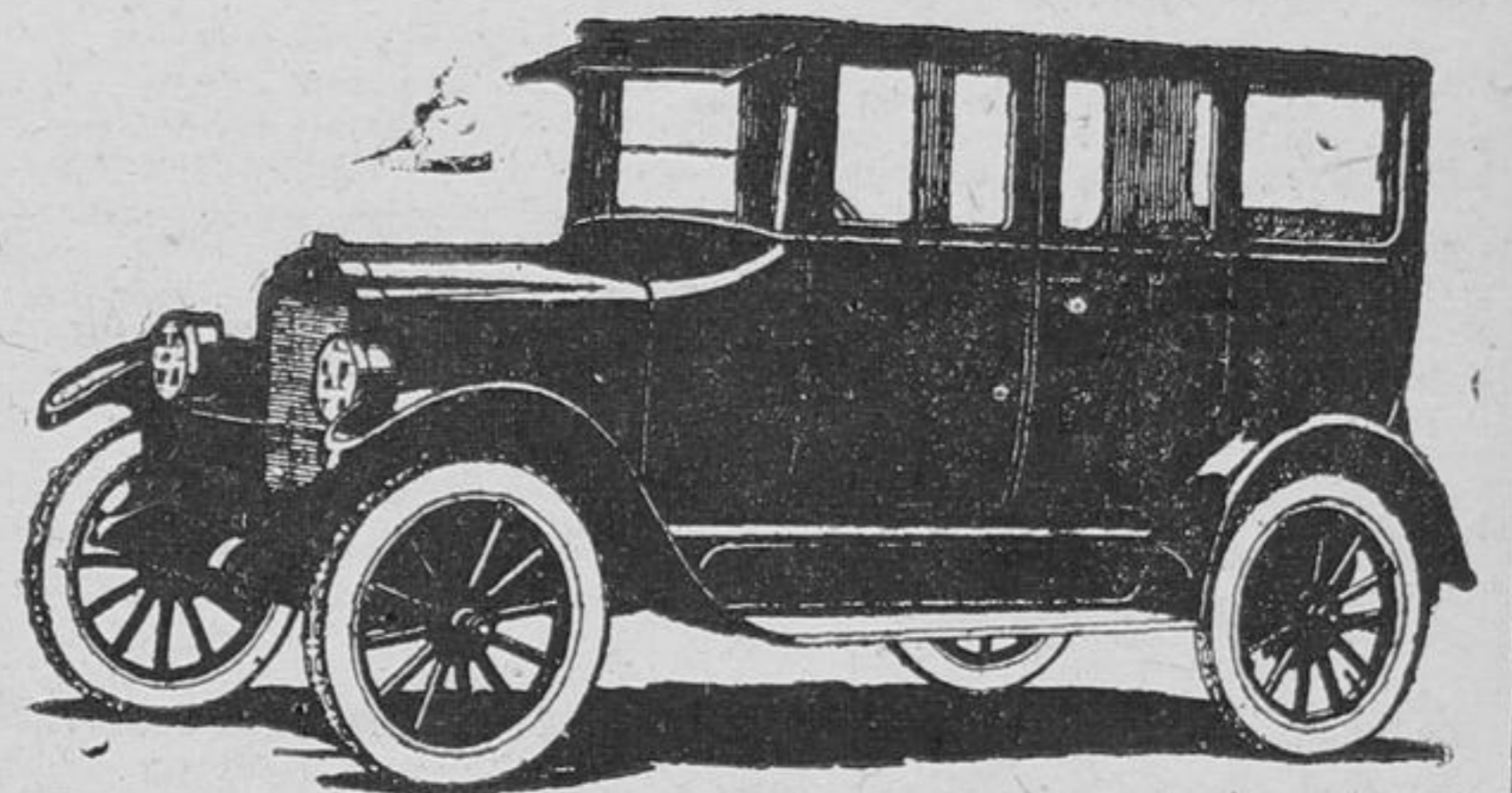


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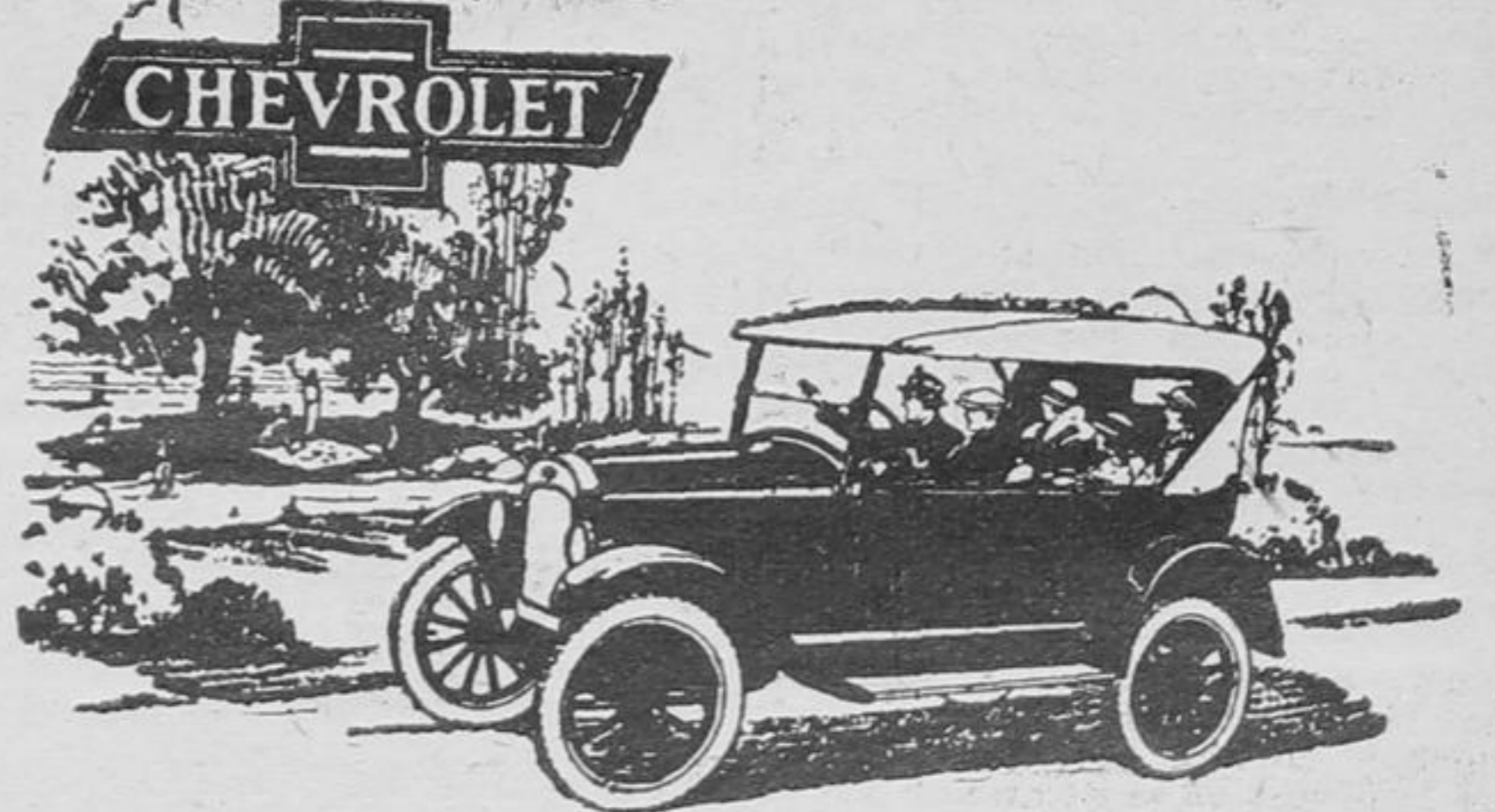
