for Community Action in Control of European Corn Borer

No single farmer can expect to keep his corn crop free of the European Corn Borer unless all his neighbours are also fighting the pest. For this reason some sort of cooperation is essential. You can organize your whole neighborhood by arranging a mutual plan of campaign whereby each farmer undertakes to account for the Corn Borers on his own farm.

This plan will assist in bringing the Corn Borer under control, but without such co-operation, satisfactory results will not be obtained.

A Very Important Point

Cut corn crop low and as soon as it is ready. Burn all corn stalks. Garden sweet corn should all be pulled early and burnt.

Plough down all corn stubble very carefully. Seed to winter wheat where possible. Write for pamphlet, post free.
