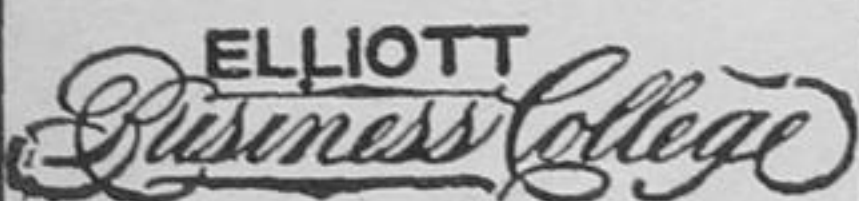

Are you good at conundrums? The Toronto Star last Saturday gave the following: "What is the name of the Canadian paper that in a single day editorially denounced the premier of Britain, the premier of South Africa, the premier of Canada, the premier of Ontario, the leader of the opposition in the Canadian House of Commons, all the Toronto and York M.P.'s save one, and the Toronto Presbytery of the Presbyterian Church?"

Come now Mr. Star, that's too easy. Any school boy could guess that the first time.

There is reason to believe that business in Canada is improving, and in comparison with other countries we have little to complain of.

M. E. Thornton, Superintendent of Colonization of C.P.R., after making a journey across the border, said "Optimism should be the keynote in Western Canada, if you can judge by comparison with the country lying to the south of us. After an extended trip down the Pacific coast as far as Los Angeles, I am firmly convinced that Canada is on top of the world sitting in a better position for the rapid return of prosperity than any other country."

**THE POSTAL STRIKE**

The public will be pleased to know that the postal strikers in Toronto and other places have returned to their work. It cannot be said, however, that the strike settlement has been satisfactorily settled, and that the alleged grievances have been removed.

Strike settlements should be made in writing. In all of the Toronto daily papers on Monday it was stated that the men went back to work on the understanding that the Government had granted the requests. Mr. Murdoch, speaking for the Government, says that no such promises were made. Verbal conversations in cases like the above are not satisfactory.

**A PLEBISCITE COMING**

It behoves the temperance people of this Province to be up and doing. No doubt before the snow falls the electors will be asked to say whether they wish the present Temperance Act to be continued, or to change it for something like the sale of beer and wine, or Government sale of liquor.

At a meeting last evening in the interest of W. H. Edwards, Conservative candidate for North-West Toronto, Hon. Dr. Godfrey, Minister of Health and Labor, assured his audience that a plebiscite would be taken. The Dr. did not give the date, but Dr. McCausland, Conservative candidate for South West Toronto said he would almost stake his reputation that the vote would be taken and before the end of October. The whole trend of the speeches last evening was: "Elect Mr. Edwards, the Conservative candidate, and a plebiscite will assuredly be granted this fall."

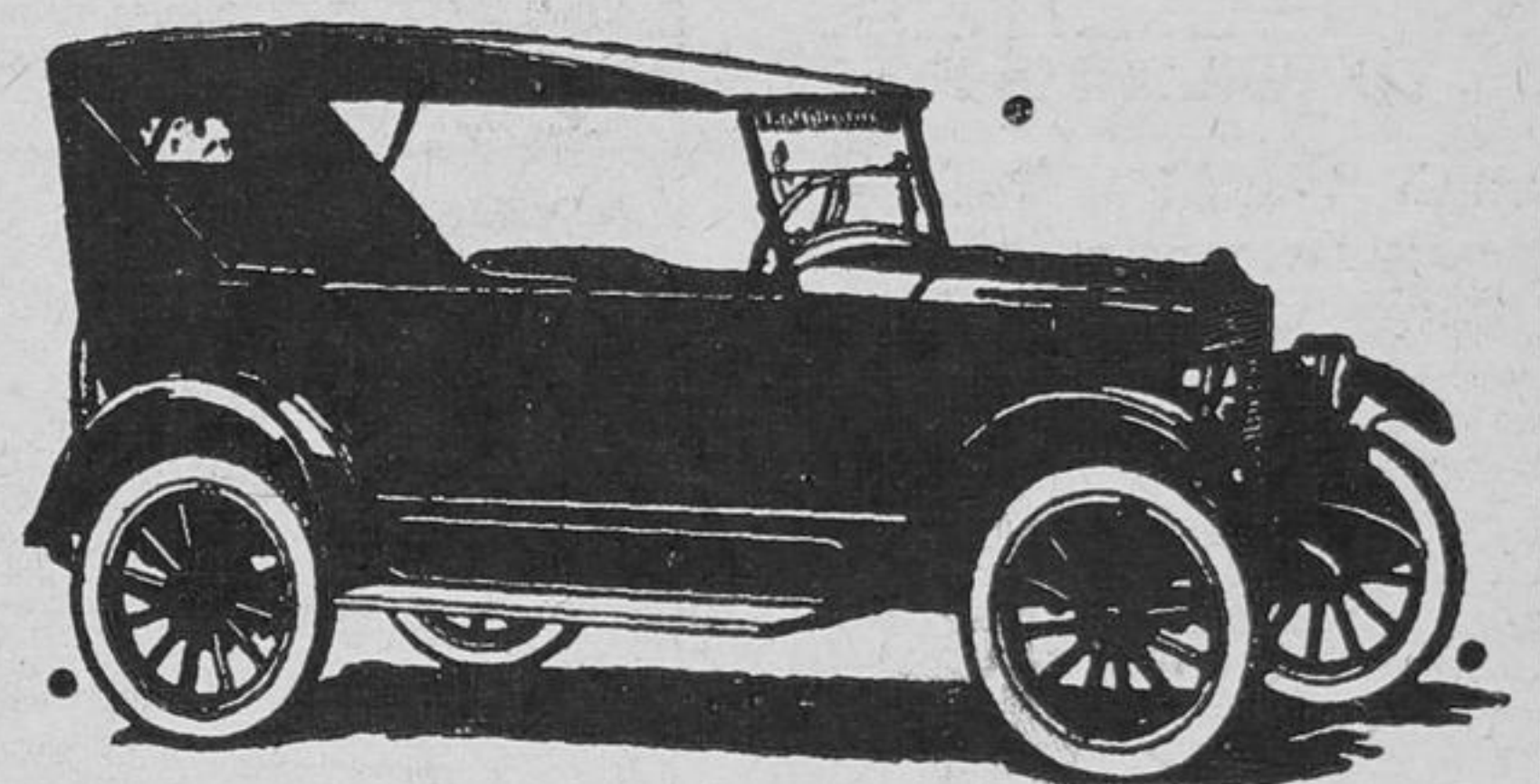

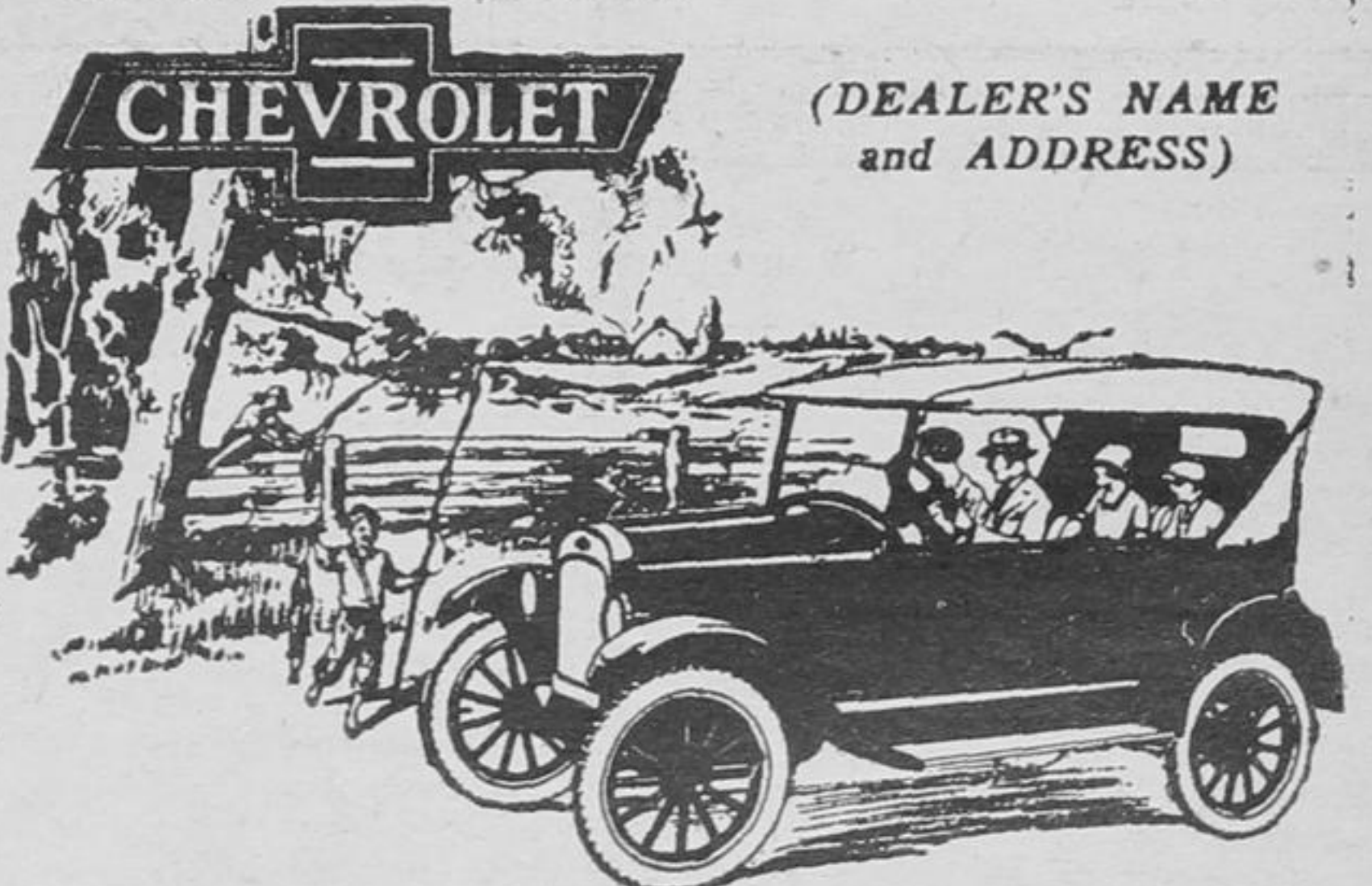
