#### Tour of Inspection

York County Council closed its June session Thursday forenoon. By resolution, the whole Council, after closing, paid a visit of inspection to the Industrial Home near Newmarket. The home was found to be in splendid condition, the sleeping apartments for both men and women neat and clean, and the bedding spotless. After a good dinner served by the matron and her helpers the Councillors walked over the well-kept farm of 140 acres. There were 64 inmates in the Home—48 men and 16 women, all apparently happy and contented.

Before leaving the Home, short speeches were made by Warden Gardhouse, County Councillors Pearson, Pugsley, McMurphy, Weldrick, Spragge, and the County Clerk, R. Phillips.

The party in eleven motor cars afterwards made a visit to the land recently acquired for reforestation purposes. This land is situated on the 8th of Whitchurch, about two miles north of Ballentrae.

Six hundred acres, have been taken over and 150 acres have already been planted, under the supervision and at the expense of the Provincial Government. Owing to the success of the venture the committee recommended the extension of the area over another 400 acres and the plant-

ing of the whole area with suitable trees.

A total of 176,500 trees have been planted this year, and their growth is already very marked. The trees are: white pine, 13,000; Norway pine, 43,000; Scotch pine, 65,000; jack pine, 42,000; tamarack, 7,500; and Carolina poplar, 6,000. They were planted at a cost of \$1,479.

The Councillors separated for their several homes about 5 o'clock, apparently well pleased with their tour of inspection.
