VILLAGE COUNCIL

The Council held a special meeting on June 24th for the purpose of opening tenders for the construction of drains on parts of certain streets in the Village.

Tenders were received from eleven different firms. That of Sheardown and Britnell was accepted subject to approval of County Roads Commission.

The Council held regular meeting July 7. A deputation was present to discuss the advisability of instituting proceedings with a view of regulating the motor traffic through the village.

A footpath on Yonge street both north and south of the village was suggested. Also that motor vehicles be prohibited from parking in the village. The Council favored the idea, and suggested that the townships of Markham and Vaughan be asked to co-operate.

Mr. Frisby presented a bill for medical attendance for his son, for injuries received by him in the arena last winter. The Council agreed to investigate the matter, and decide what could be done.

A large number of accounts were ordered to be paid.
The Reeve and Councillor Pugsley were appointed to attend a meeting of the Highway Advisory Committee, on the 16th of July.

A resolution was passed asking the Ratepayers Association and citizens generally to co-operate with the Council in the building of a welcome arch and otherwise decorating the village on the occasion of the Orange demonstration to be held here on the 12th.

The clerk was instructed to order one tank of road oil to be applied not later than Thursday, and also to obtain the price of "No Parking" signs.

The reeve reported that he had seen the County Road Commissioners in the matter of Centre Street east draining, and that the Commissioners would visit the village on the 18th of July for the purpose of looking over the ground.
