POLITICS IN NORTH YORK

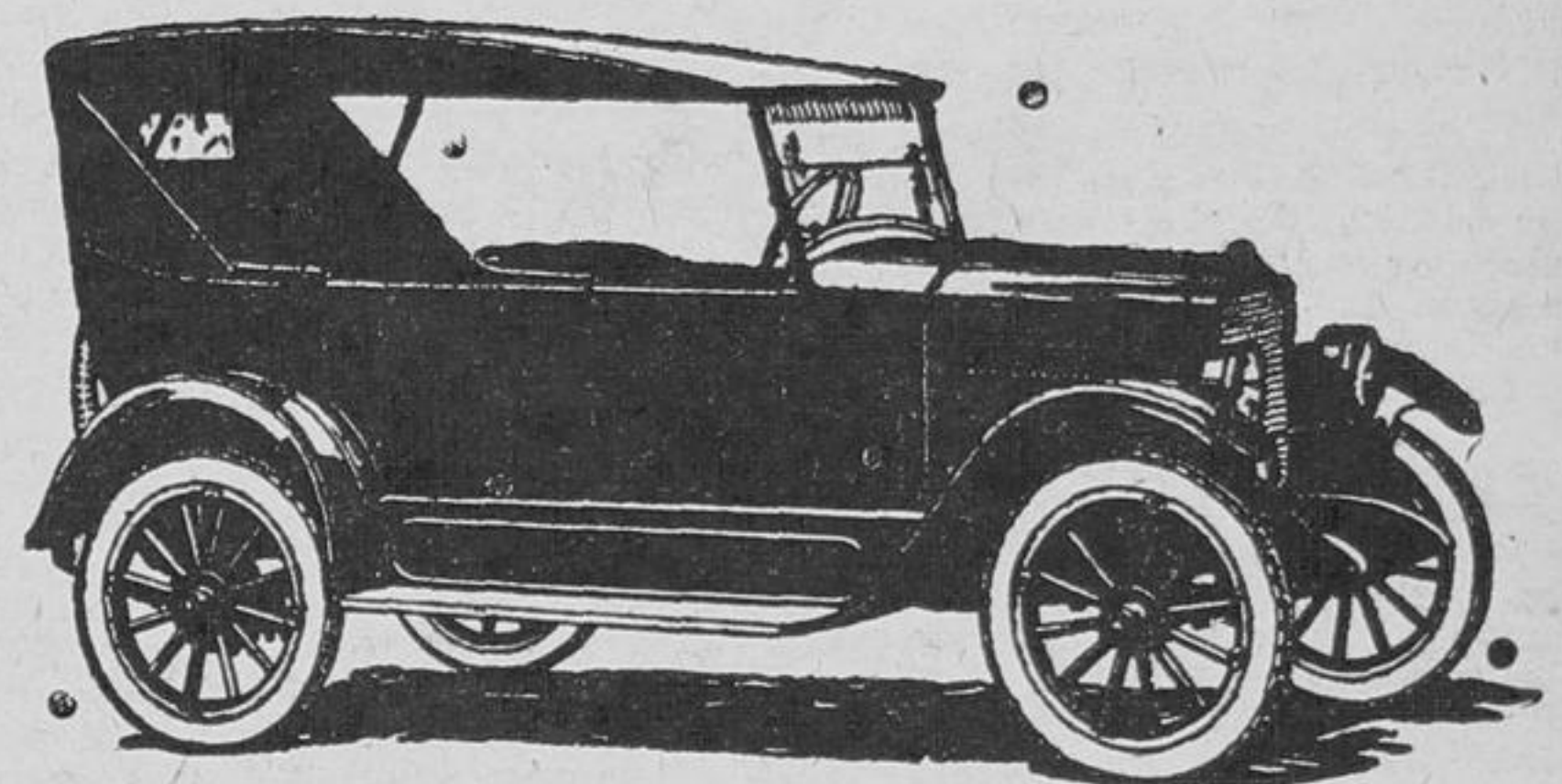
