THE SENATE AGAIN

Premier King must be commended in his promise to reform the Canadian Senate. It is hoped the word "reform" means something for the better, though any change might be an improvement. We honestly believe the Liberal party would abolish the Senate altogether if they felt they would be supported by a majority of the electorate.

Conservatives, however, as a body, take no stand against interfering with that honorable body, the greater part of whom owe their life positions to work done for one party or the other. About the only argument put forward in favor of the Senate is that it may act as a check on hasty legislation passed by the House of Commons. But why not hold the members of Parliament responsible for any measures that may be thought to be hasty? At the present time the Senate is holding up appropriations for branch lines of the Canadian National Railway, which Parliament has declared necessary, two years in succession. But as members of the Senate are appointed for life they are perfectly independent, and responsible to no person.

No doubt, it would be an improvement to have the members elected by the people for a term of years, but even then they would vote Liberal or Conservative, as they do now, in order to assist their own particular party and hamper their opponents.

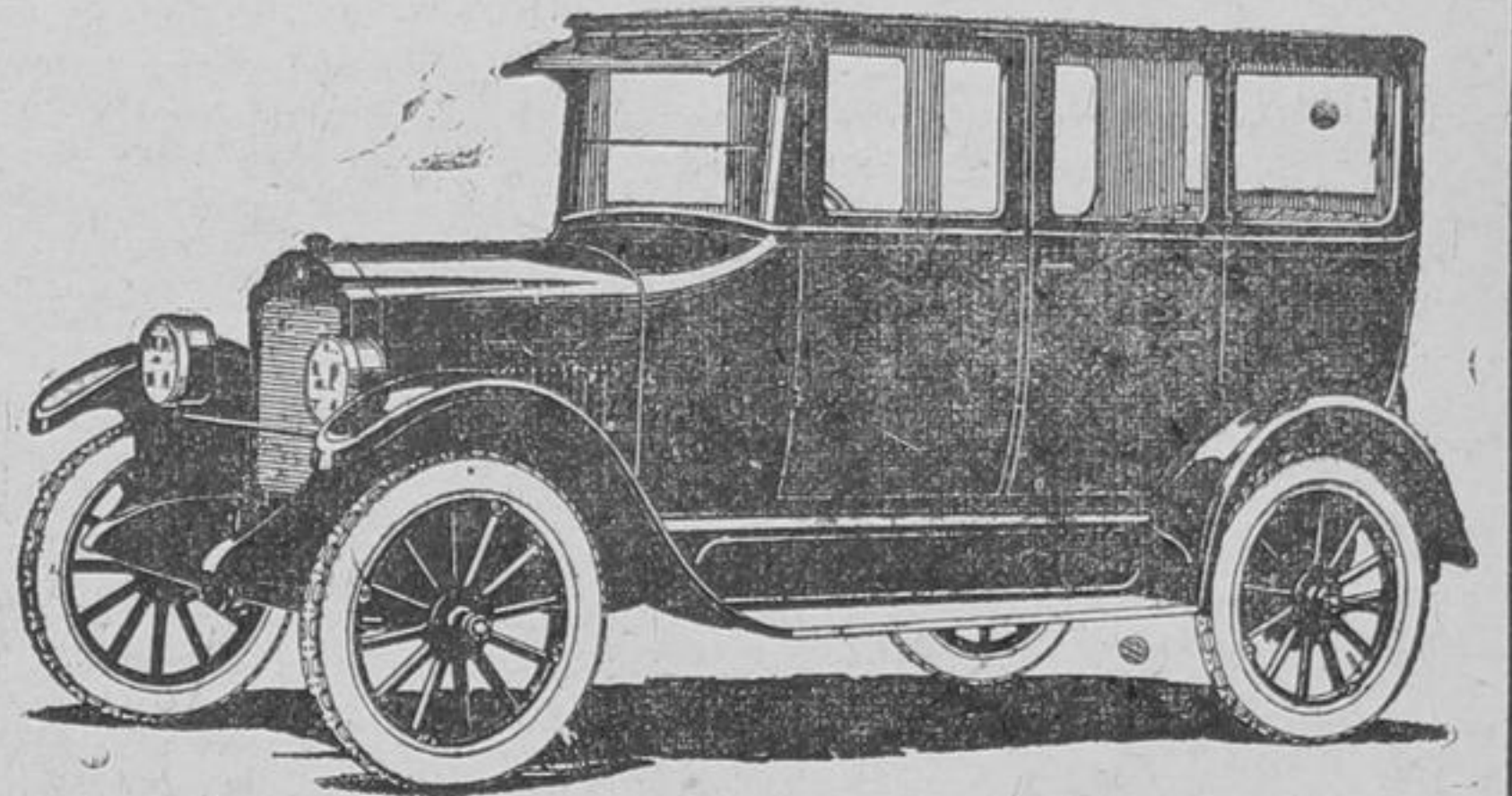

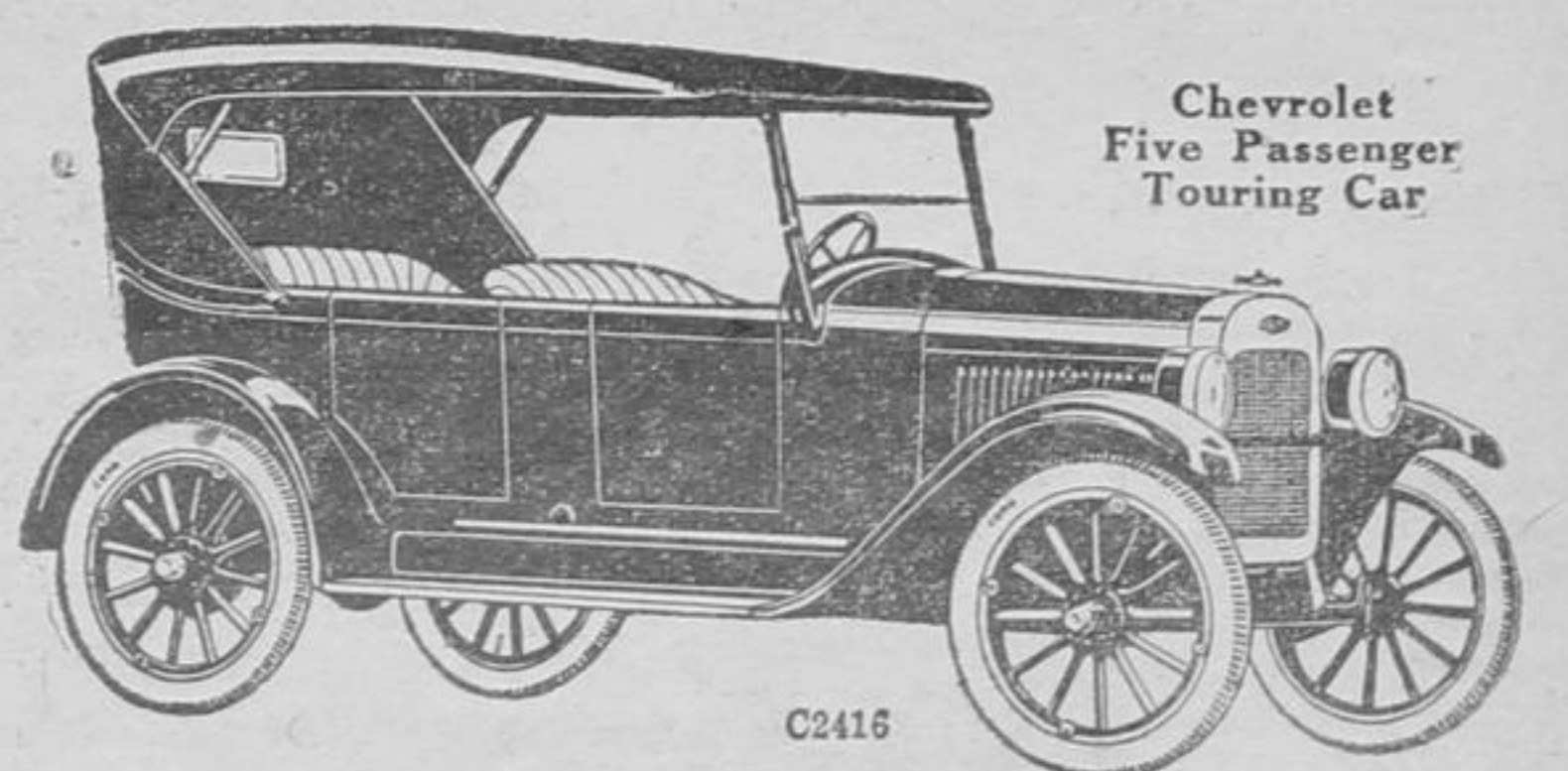
