## Cut the Weeds

The Village Council has had notices  
printed drawing attention to an Act  
to prevent the spread of noxious weeds,  
the first paragraph of which reads as  
follows: "Every occupant of land, or  
the owner, if land is unoccupied, shall  
cut down or destroy all the Canada  
thistles, ox-eye daisy, wild oats, rag-  
weed-burdock and all other noxious  
weeds growing thereon." The minimum  
fine for neglect to obey the order is \$5.  
Numerous complaints have been made  
to the Council with regard to weeds in  
the Village.

## High School Board

The Board of Education held a meet-  
ing in the High School Monday even-  
ing. The following members were

order of 80 desks and seats was given  
Mr. Adams, and an order for teachers  
desks and chairs for the new High  
School building to be opened the latter  
part of October. Was given to a firm  
in Preston.

school, reported that the rooms were  
full, and that no more outside pupils  
could be admitted.
