Mr. J. J. Morrison, secretary of the United Farmers of Ontario, stated Monday that the Association has ceased to exist as a political organization. The U. F. O., Mr. Morrison declared, is out of politics in accordance with a resolution passed at the last meeting held in Massey Hall some time ago.

There seems to be a limit to the strength of the strongest of people. Sir Adam Beck, Chairman of the Provincial Hydro-Electric Commission has been ordered by his physician to retire to his home in London, and take a rest. Sir Adam was taken ill in Toronto last week. He suffered from a lingering indisposition during the past summer.

Machinery for the taking of the plebiscite on the 23rd of October has been set in motion by the Attorney-General, Hon. W. F. Nickle, K. C., who has sent a letter to the members of the House, asking them to submit names for the position of returning officers in each riding in the Province. Mr. Nickle says that only experienced men will be considered for the positions.

A great deal is being said these days about the impossibility of enforcing the O. T. A. Mr. J. D. Flavelle, who was chairman of the Ontario License Board for six years says it is quite possible to enforce it. At a recent meeting Mr. Flavelle said: "It is quite possible to enforce the provision of the Ontario Temperance Act and believed that within a reasonable time this law would be reasonably enforced as any other difficult law on the statute books of the Province."

A LOST OPPORTUNITY
Under the heading "Freer Trade" and the Farmer, the Mail and Empire's leading editorial on Monday dealt with the great reduction of the exports from Canada to the United States since the latter placed a higher duty on farm products entering that country. The products dealt with are cattle, eggs, potatoes, beef, pork, sheep and wheat.

In 1921, before the higher duty was added, the exports from Canada to the U. S. amounted to more than \$120,000,000, and in 1924 the amount was only \$26,000,000 a reduction of \$94,000,000.

The figures given by the Mail and Empire are, no doubt, strictly correct. The sad part about it is that Canada has no control over the high protection put on by the United States. But can farmers not see that they lost their great opportunity in 1911 when they rejected the offer of the United States of a free market in all the above named products. "Of all sad words of tongue or pen, the saddest are these—it might have been."

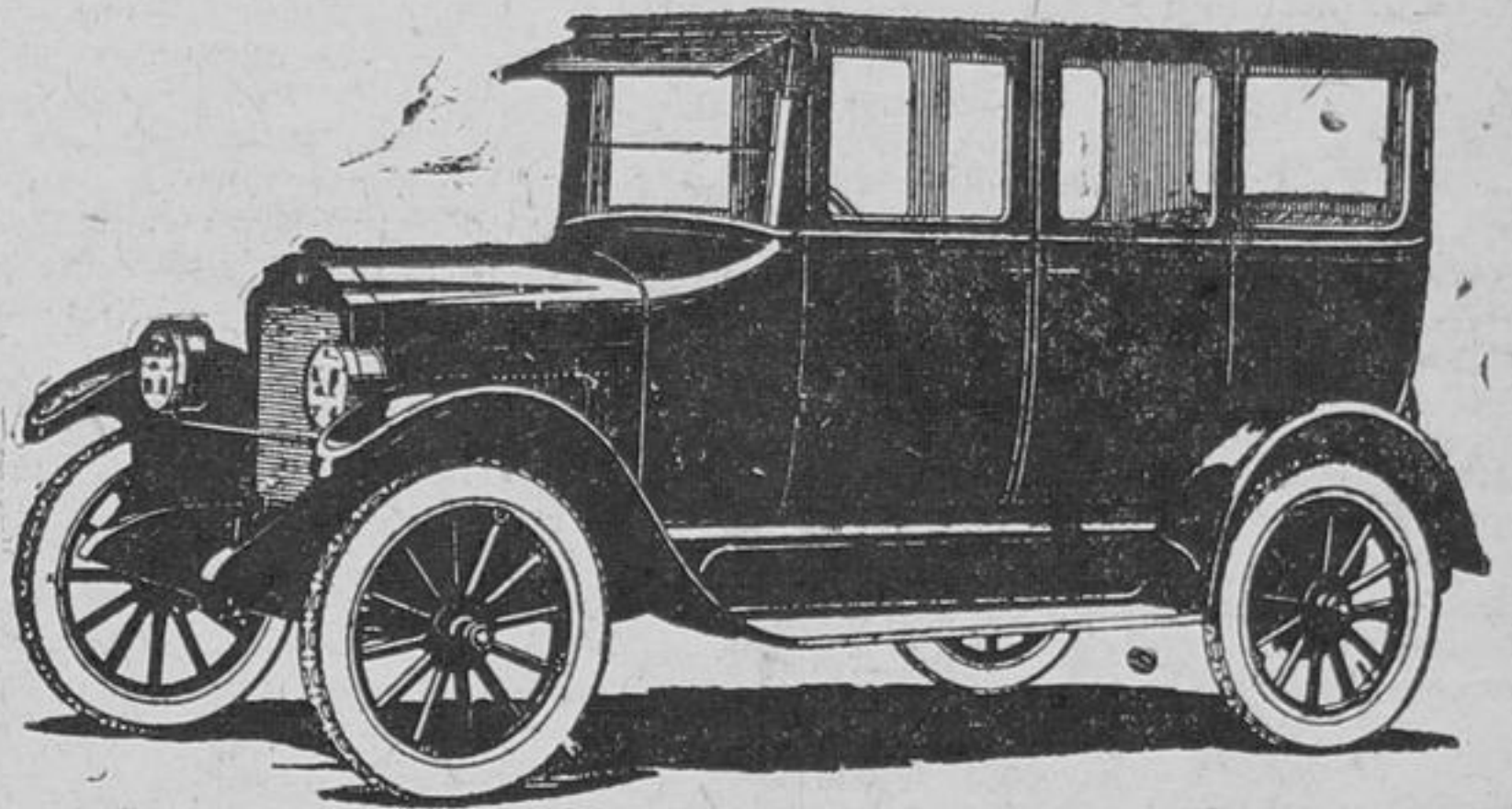

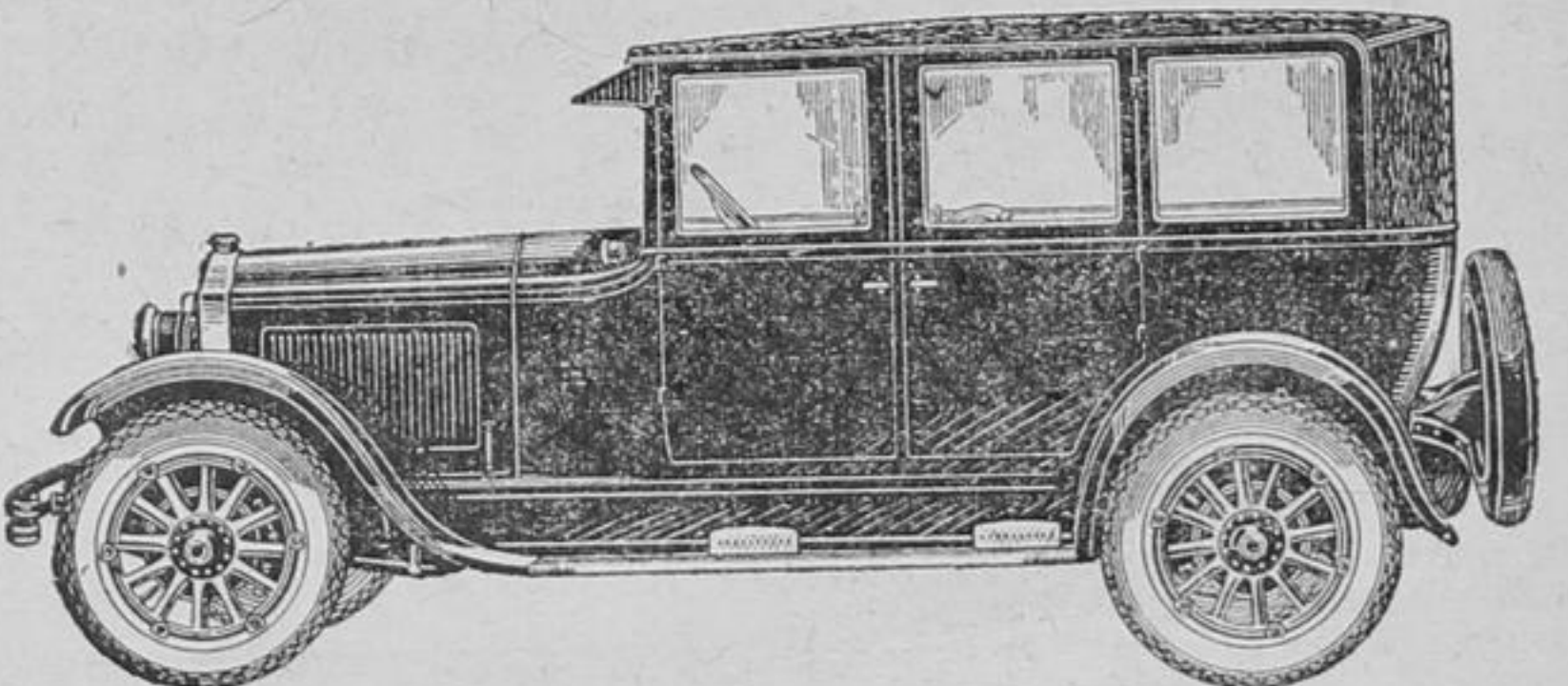
