Death of Andrew Russell

After an illness extending over several months Mr. Andrew Russell passed away at his home at Carrville, Vaughan Township, Saturday morning, September 6. Mr. Russell was one of the best known men in the Township. He was for a number of years prominent in municipal life, having been Reeve of the Township, and Warden of the County of York. He was the last surviving brother of the Russell family who were widely known as successful breeders of Shorthorn cattle. The other brothers were James and William who sold their 300 acre farm to the City of Toronto for the Industrial Farm, Alexander, of Unionville, and John, a barrister in Winnipeg. Deceased is survived by his widow and two sisters, Mrs. Isaacs and Mrs. Lauder. The funeral to the Richmond Hill Cemetery Tuesday afternoon was largely attended by relatives and friends. The service was conducted by Rev. J. Kell.
