The deceased was a Past Master of Concord L. O. L. 135, and an ardent advocate of the principles of the Orangemen's Order. Politically Mr. Oster was a staunch Conservative.

Edgar Plewman who recently arrived home on furlough after sixteen years on the mission field in West China. Most of those present were associated with Mr. Plewman in Choir, Sunday School and League work of Parliament St., Methodist Church twenty-five or thirty years ago.

After a couple of hours spent in renewing acquaintances and in a lively game of baseball the guests partook of the bountiful repast provided by the hostess, following which Mr. R. M. Yeomans was appointed chairman and called on a number of those present for short addresses, interspersed by the singing of old familiar hymns and songs. Two former pastors, Rev. A. C. Crews, D.D., editor of S. S. publications, and the Rev. A. B. Chambers, a veteran of 83 years, gave a short address, as also did Rev. F. C. Stephenson, M. D., H. C. Hocken, M. P., Mr. James Simpson, and Mr. Richard Plewman.
