AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that such appeals must be by NOTICE IN WRITING IN THE PRESCRIBED FORM, signed by the complainant IN DUPLICATE and given to the local Municipal Clerk, or left for him at his address, as stated above, on or before the date indicated.

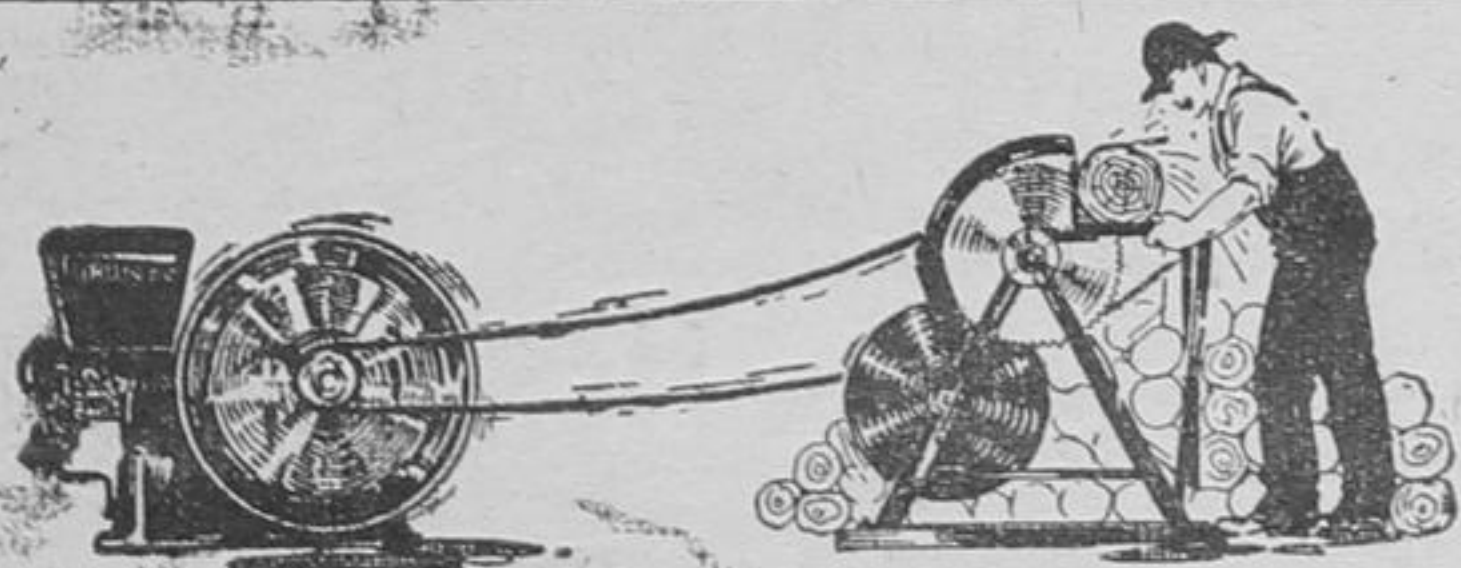

Evidently Premier Ferguson thinks it wise to tell the electors that the Government does not propose to frame a law such as in operation in those Provinces. The following paragraph is taken from Premier Ferguson's statement to the press:

"Government control, in the view of the government, does not mean a system of sale such as in operation in Quebec and British Columbia. It means that the government will make all sales and that the people will be given opportunity, as expressed by their votes at the polls, of purchasing beer and liquors under strict regulations."

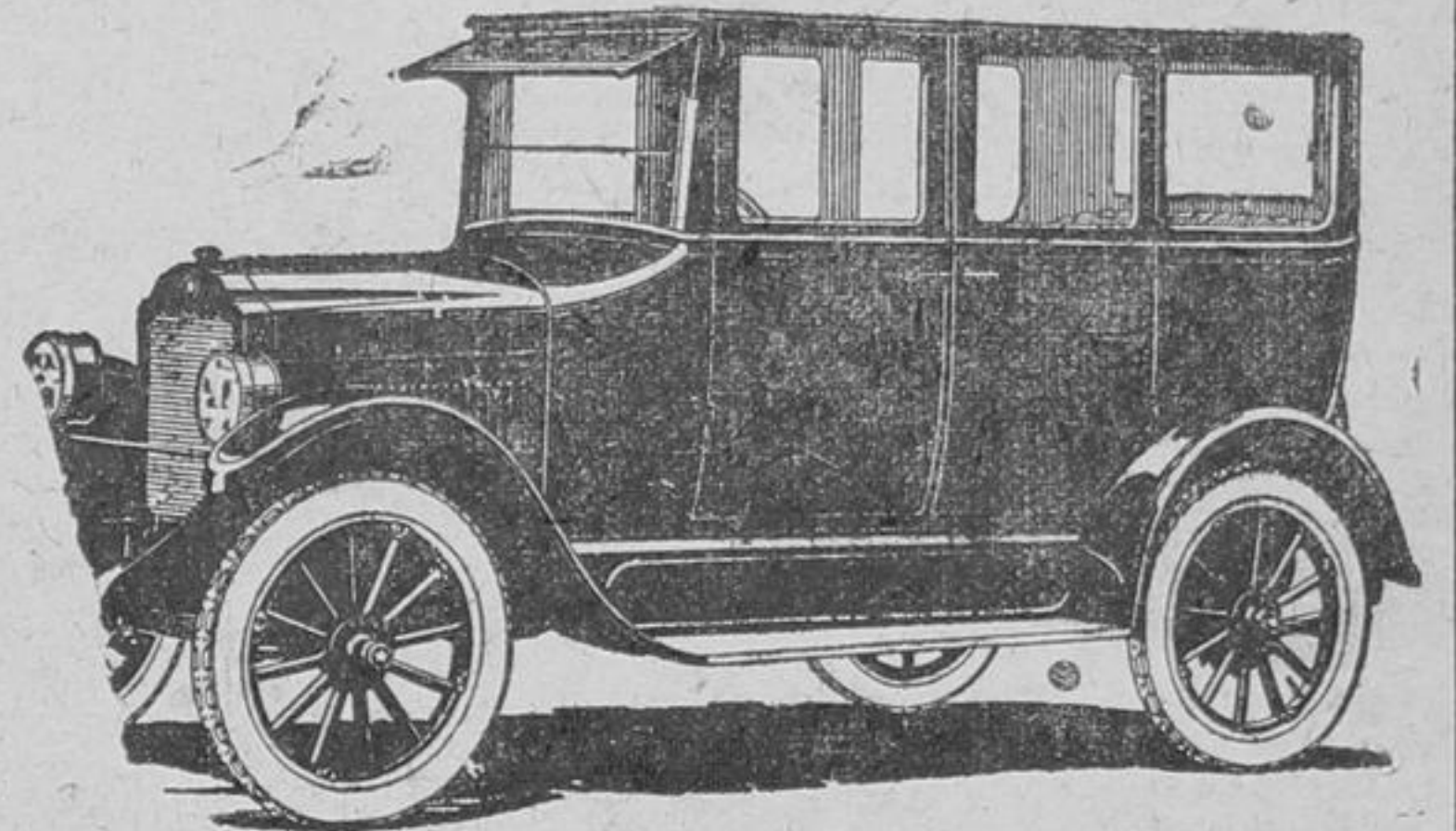

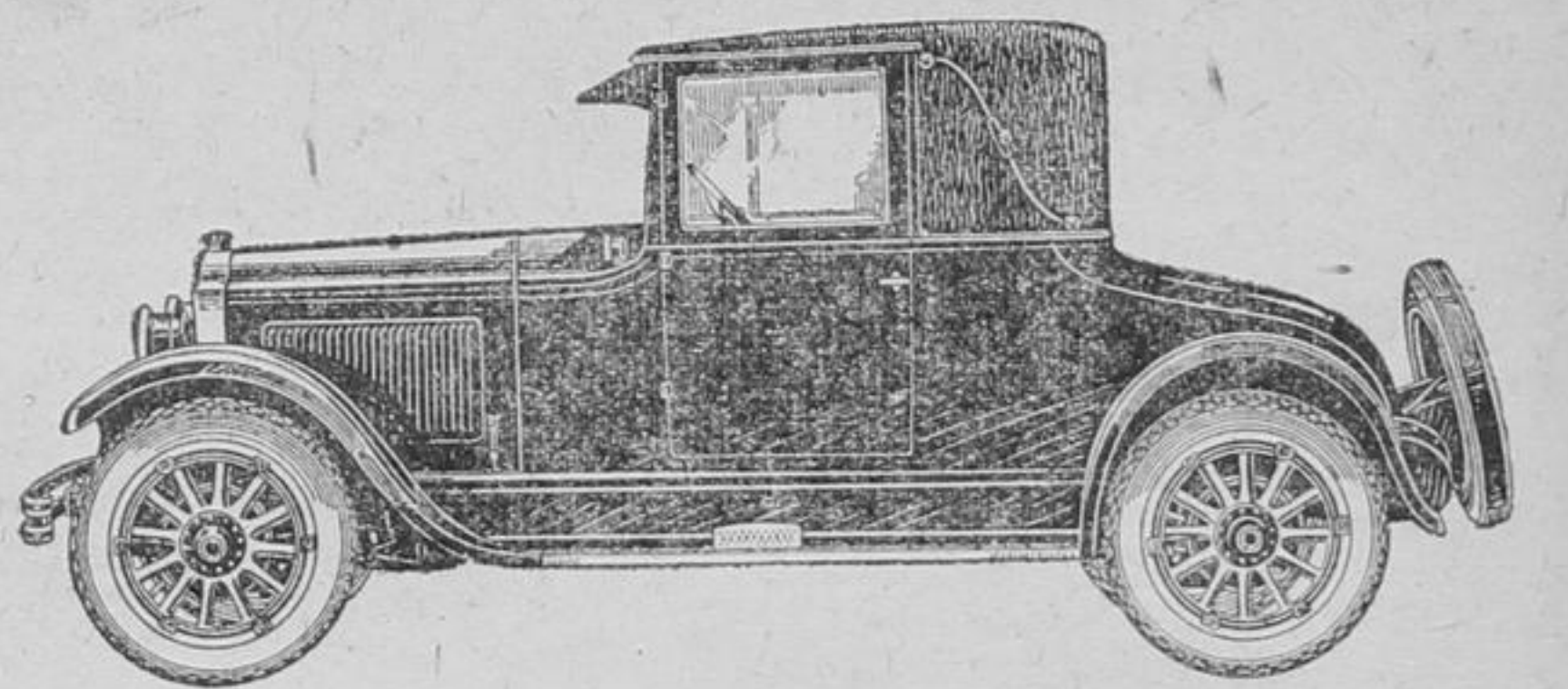
