NOTICE OF SITTINGS OF REVISING OFFICER IN THE ELECTORAL DISTRICT OF EAST YORK

TAKE NOTICE that Sittings of the Revising Officer for the purpose of hearing complaints or appeals with regard to the Voters' Lists to be used at the Plebiscite held under The Ontario Temperance Act, 1924, for the Electoral District of EAST YORK, will be held to hear complaints as to the Lists of Voters for the various Municipalities comprised in the said Electoral District, and that His Honor JUDGE O'CONNELL will be the Revising Officer.

AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that such appeals must be by NOTICE IN WRITING IN THE PRESCRIBED FORM, signed by the complainant IN DUPLICATE and given to the local Municipal Clerk, or left for him at his address, as stated above, on or before the date indicated.

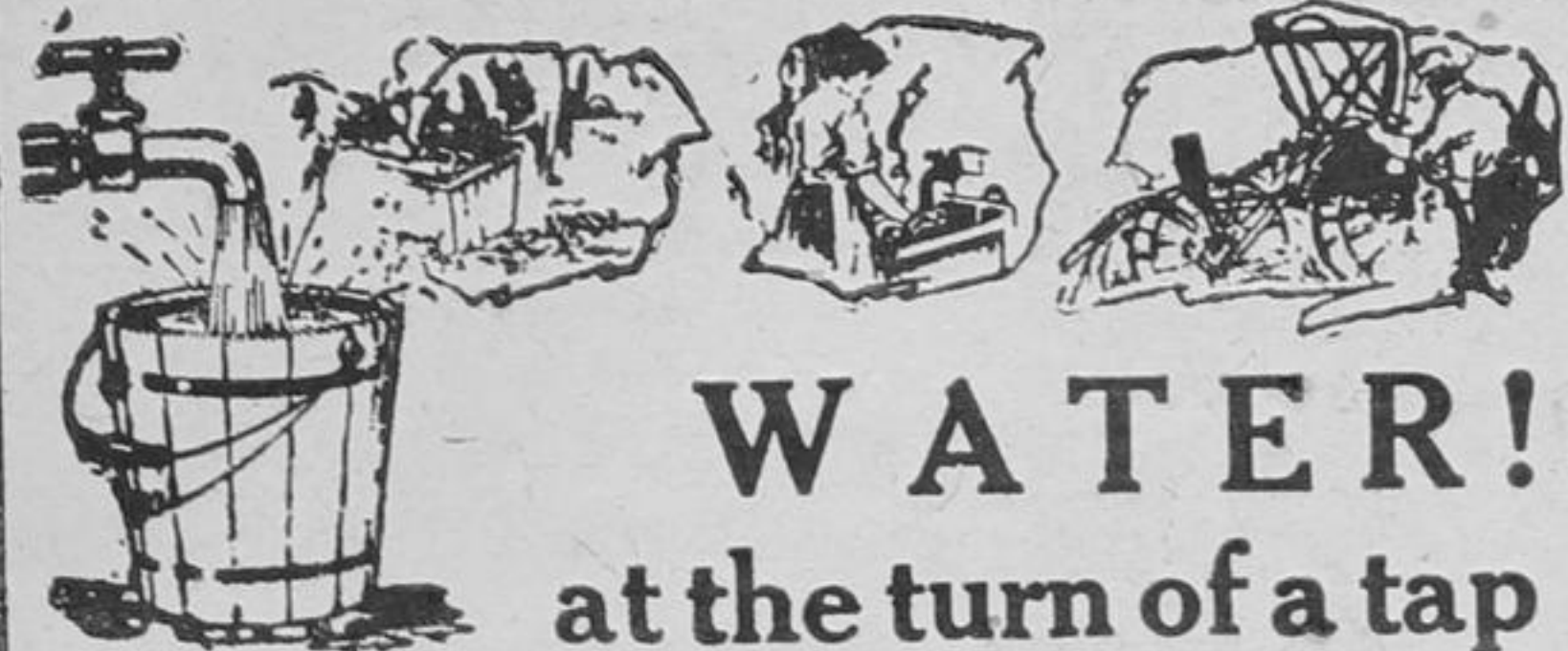

The Mail and Empire in an editorial paragraph says that whatever law the people of Ontario decree on the 23rd of next month, it will lay upon the Government the obligation to stamp out the bootlegger. The Harvest Home Services of Newtonbrook church will take place Oct. 5, and the tea and entertainment on Wednesday, Oct. 8.

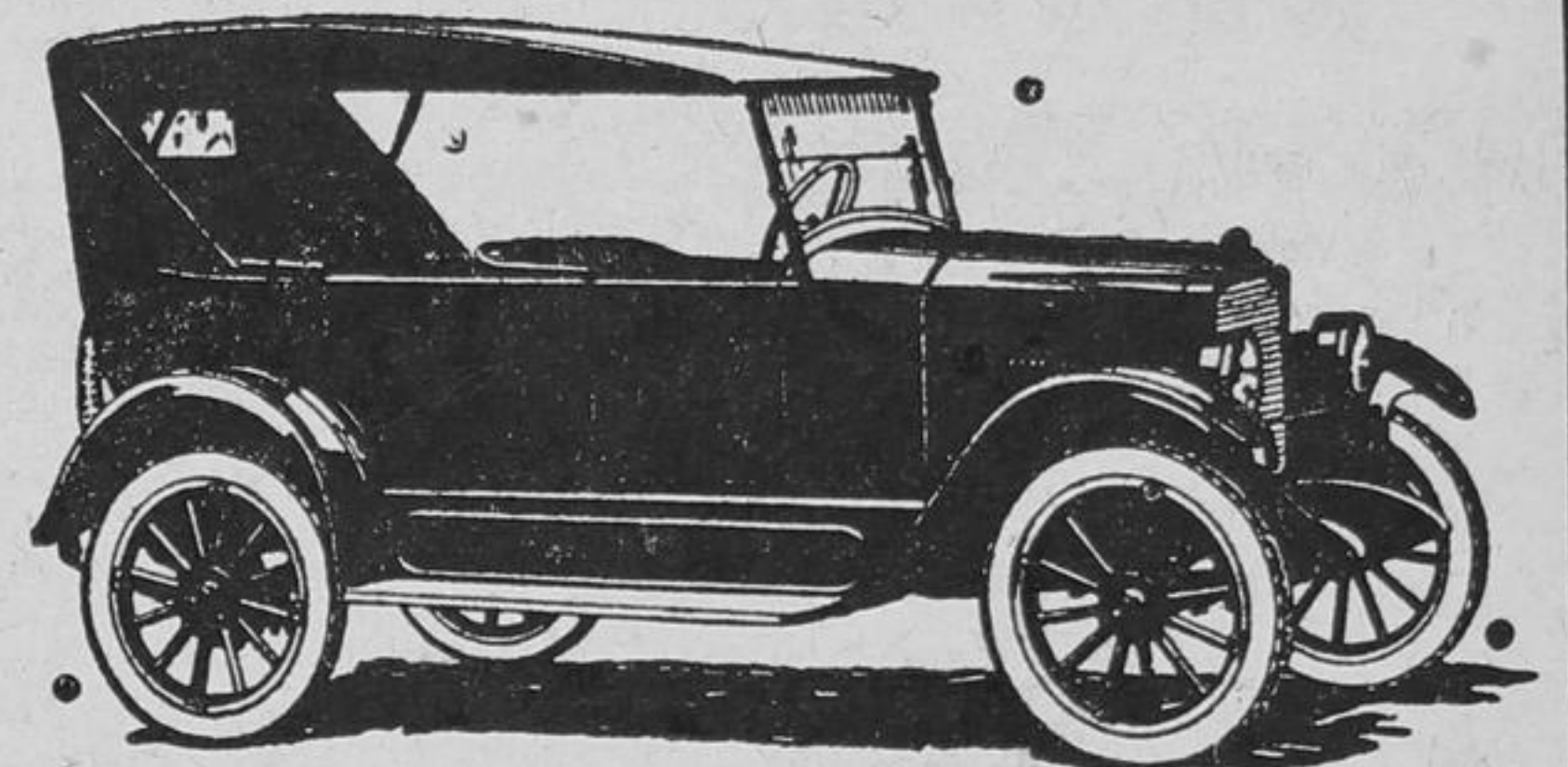
