Ottawa Public School Male Teach-
ers' Club following the stand of the
Toronto teachers, has put itself on
record in regard to Prohibition as
strongly endorsing the Ontario Tem-
perance Act and pledging its mem-
bers to use their influence to secure
a favorable vote on the 23rd of Oc-
tober. Surely such resolutions com-
ing from responsible bodies should
make careless people stop and think
before depositing their ballots
against a law that has done so much
for women, children and the home.

The articles now appearing in the
Toronto Daily Star by a staff corres-
pondent, bearing on the drink ques-
tion in the Western Provinces show
that drunkenness has much increas-
ed under Government sale. The

from the Chief of Police, Police
Magistrates and other reliable
sources. Monday's article stated
that in Calgary Alberta, the increase
in all forms of drunkenness worked
out to 52 per cent. in June and July;
and in Edmonton the increase was
111 per cent. There is no limit to
the quantity of liquor a person can
buy in those provinces

being shaken up.

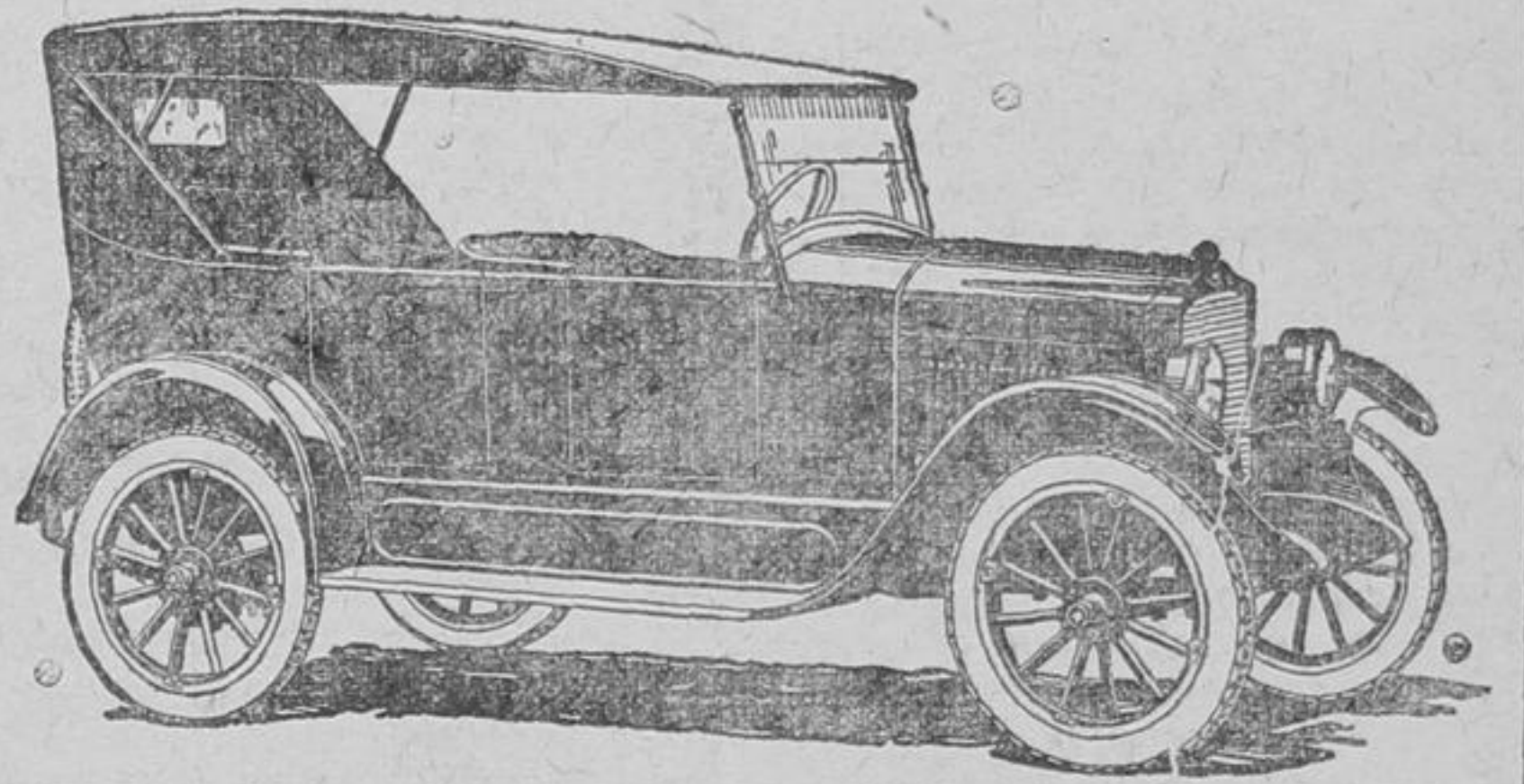
Mr. Fletcher Thompson, of Thomp-
