Plowing Match

Bills are out announcing the annual Plowing Match of King and Vaughan, on the farm of Mr. Geo. Coutts, one mile north of Teston, Friday of next week. There are 9 classes, and upwards of \$500 will be given in prizes. The Ladies' Aid of Teston will serve meals in the hall at the church grounds.

Majority 344

Last Thursday's vote in Richmond Hill was most satisfactory to the temperance forces. Out of a total of 854 names on the Voters' List 577 votes were cast, and of these 457 were dry, and 113 wet. The majority was 344, a little better than 4 to 1, in favor of the present temperance act. There were 7 spoiled ballots.

The O. T. A. Sustained

Although the majority sustaining the present law is not as large as could be desired, all things considered the temperance forces are well satisfied with a majority of over 40,000 for the Province.

Toronto and other large cities went wet by a large vote, but that was more than counterbalanced by good work in towns, villages and farming districts.

The programme given by Mr. Duncan Mackenzie, supervisor of music, and 14 girls from Toronto was very much enjoyed.
