BOARD OF EDUCATION

Every member of the Board was present at a special meeting in the new High School Friday evening. Eight applications were read asking for the position of Janitor for the Public Schools and the new High School. The application of Mr. Wade, the present Janitor, was accepted for the Public Schools at a salary of \$750, and the application of Mr. Sanders for the new High School at a salary of \$850. Cowie-Glass—That the three stoves now in use at the Masonic Hall, be offered for sale for \$45. McCague-Gee—In amendment that the stoves be offered for \$50, pipes included. The amendment carried. A resolution was passed authorizing the purchase of 25 copies of "Story of the British People," and a map of the County of York, for use in the Public School.

Traffic Problem Debated

About 75 representatives from King, Whitechurch, Markham, Vaughan, and Richmond Hill and York Township met at Aurora on Monday to discuss requirements on Yonge Street, and to provide for the safety of pedestrians by building sidewalks. A resolution was carried asking that a line should be declared in the townships, on the east side of Yonge Street, making it 106 feet wide as far north as Mulock's Corners. Dealing with the question of transportation, C. L. Wilson, and W. R. Robertson, of the Hydro-Electric Railway, expressed a desire to co-operate with the municipalities in giving a good service, but they objected to competition with a line of busses. Those gentlemen declared the radial was the people's road, and ought to be supported. The opinion expressed by W. H. Pugsley, T. H. Trench, J. A. Greene, T. F. McMahon and others was that the Hydro was not justified in raising their rates on Yonge Street, and they

could not favor a law to legislate bus-owners out of existence.

J. M. Walton, Mayor of Aurora presided.

The trustees of the Methodist Church have had a new furnace installed and the church beautifully decorated. Re-opening services were held on Sunday when impressive and inspiring sermons were preached by Rev. Dr. R. N. Burns, of Toronto. Special music was rendered by the choir assisted by Miss Pearl Brock, Miss E. Fry, Mrs. S. D. Roberts and Mrs. T. McBride, of Toronto. The collections amounted to \$111.53.

Communion services were held in St. Andrew's Church on Sunday when Rev. Mr. Moffat occupied the pulpit. Rev. S. R. and Mrs. Robinson and Miss Ruth Robinson, of Markham, spent the week end with friends in the village. On Saturday the King City football team won the final of the cup games from Elder's by a score of 2-0. The latter team held the cup last year. Six young men and four young ladies were received into the membership of the Methodist church at the service on Sunday morning. Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Manning and Mr. and Mrs. Howard Manning spent the week-end with Rev. F. W. and Mrs. Leggett, of Stayner, and also friends in Clarksburg.

VICTORIA SQUARE

The Mock Parliament was interesting and well attended. The leader of the Government, introduced a measure "It's better to have loved and lost than never to have loved at all." The question was debated in a lively way, and the Government majority was five. The following is the speech from the throne, read by the speaker, Rev. Mr. Warren:

Rideau Hall, Ottawa
To the Hon. the Members of the House of Commons, Canada:
On this the twenty-first day of the tenth month in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and twenty-four, it affords His Majesty, Geo. V King of Great Britain and Emperor of all India, through His Excellency Lord Byng of Vimy, very great pleasure to formally open this the Second Parliament during His Majesty's reign, of the Great Dominion of Canada, meeting as it is in this beautiful thriving capital city of Victoria Square.

We would return thanks to Almighty God for His wonderful blessings to the people of Canada, enabling them to garner in an abundant harvest, to profit by enlarging markets, and to live in peace and in a measure of dryness with their neighbors.

His Majesty is thankful for the continuing bond of Internationalism in binding the Dominion to the Motherland, and is especially over-joyed at the enthusiastic reception everywhere accorded his Son, Edward Plantagenet, Prince of Wales, during his recent visit.

And now the Hon. members of the House of Commons are called to assume the responsibilities of Government. Important and weighty matters will be introduced for your consideration. Some of these have to deal with so vital an organism as the heart and so desirable a spot as a home built for two. You may be asked to pass legislation relative to the happiness of the lone bachelor, that he may never more be forced to cook his own meals or wear thin his trousers at the knee.
