**New Issue of Notes**

The Fifteenth Annual Report of the  
 Imperial Bank of Canada which was  
 presented at the recent meeting of the  
 shareholders of that institution shows  
 that the Bank has fully maintained its  
 position as one of the strongest and  
 soundest financial institutions in  
 Canada.

Marking this occasion, the Imperial  
 Bank placed in circulation on De-  
 cember 22nd a new issue of Bank notes  
 in denominations of \$5., \$10., \$20., \$50.,  
 and \$100. These notes are handsome  
 examples of fine bank note work em-  
 bodying modern features of protec-  
 tion against counterfeiting, which in-  
 clude fine steel engraved portraits of  
 the President and General Manager.  
 The fives and tens carry portraits of  
 Mr. Peleg Howland, President of the  
 Bank, on the left hand side of the  
 note, and Mr. A. E. Phipps, General  
 Manager, on the right hand side. On  
 the twenty dollar note a portrait of  
 the President appears on the face in  
 the centre, with handsomely engraved  
 lathe counters on either side carrying  
 the denomination in prominent figures  
 while on the fifty and one hundred  
 dollar notes Mr. Howland's portrait  
 appears at the right and left hand  
 sides prospectively with engraved  
 lathe counters, giving the designs a  
 pleasing and artistic appearance. It  
 is particularly appropriate that Mr.  
 Howland's portrait should appear  
 on the notes of the new issue replacing  
 that of the issue now in use of his  
 father, Mr. H. S. Howland, who was  
 the first President of the Bank when  
 it was founded fifty years ago. A uni-  
 form design has been adopted for the  
 back of the notes with denomination  
 of each shown in figures on either side  
 of the Bank's Coat-of-Arms, and  
 across the bottom in Roman lettering.  
 These represent fine examples of steel  
 engraving and printing.

**Ontario Represented at Chicago  
 Conference**

Twenty three young men and wo-  
 men from Ontario attended the con-  
 vention of representatives of Junior  
 Farmers' Clubs held during the week  
 of the Chicago International Fair. The  
 party assembled at the District Repre-  
 sentatives Office at London, Ontario,  
 leaving there on the evening of Novem-  
 ber 29th, arriving in Chicago on Sun-  
 day forenoon. On Monday, the party  
 visited the Fair being banqueted that  
 evening by the Wilson Company, the  
 distinguished visitors including the  
 Hon. John S. Martin.

On Tuesday they went on a tour of  
 the various packing which are the  
 largest in the world, and that evening  
 attended a banquet at the Drake  
 Hotel.

Wednesdays programme include  
 a visit to the New Field Museum,  
 Lincoln Park and the large Depart-  
 mental Stores winding up the day  
 with a banquet at The Morrison Hotel.

Having survived three days of sight-  
 seeing and banquets they reached the  
 climax on Thursday with a visit to the  
 I. H. C. plant, another banquet at  
 noon and a Grand Parade at night be-  
 fore President Coolidge in the great  
 Amphitheatre. Here the whole party  
 of over thirteen hundred paraded in  
 State groups in columns of eight car-  
 rying banners and flags, Ontario  
 bringing up the rear with the banner  
 of their Province and the grand old  
 flag of Canada.

On Friday the party indulged in  
 some more sightseeing leaving for  
 home in the afternoon.

While in Chicago, the Ontario party  
 was grouped with thirteen hundred  
 other delegates from forty-two states.

The party from Ontario consisted of  
 the winners of the Championship  
 prizes in the County Live Stock Judg-  
 ing and Domestic Science Judging  
 competitions and were accompanied  
 by Mr. R. H. Clemens, District Repre-  
 sentative for Wellington County and  
 Miss MacIntosh, Domestic Science  
 Representative in Peel County.

York County was represented by:  
 Miss Lillian Hart, Newmarket.  
 Miss Margaret Watson, Woodbridge.  
 Mr. Clarke Young, Milliken.  
 Mr. Thomas Hastings, Markham.
