The speaker of the evening was Canon Cody, Ex-Minister of Education, whose address was eloquent and inspiring.

Short speeches were made by Inspector Trench, Inspector Jordan, Inspector Campbell, Mr. Gardhouse, Warden of the County, and Dr. McCutcheon, of the Ontario Civil Service. A ball closed one of the most delightful evenings in the history of York County.
