It is thought the fire was caused by careless smokers throwing away lighted cigarettes in the dead grass surrounding the orchard and buildings, but rumors are afloat that it was an act of an incendiary. Mr. Hopper estimates his loss at between \$3000.00 and \$3500.00 with an expired Insurance policy as his only protection.

Stimulation of new interest coupled with ideal weather conditions made this the biggest Competition ever held in York County and probably the biggest of its kind in Ontario. The girls standing 1st and 2nd in the general standing will get a free trip to the Chicago International Show. 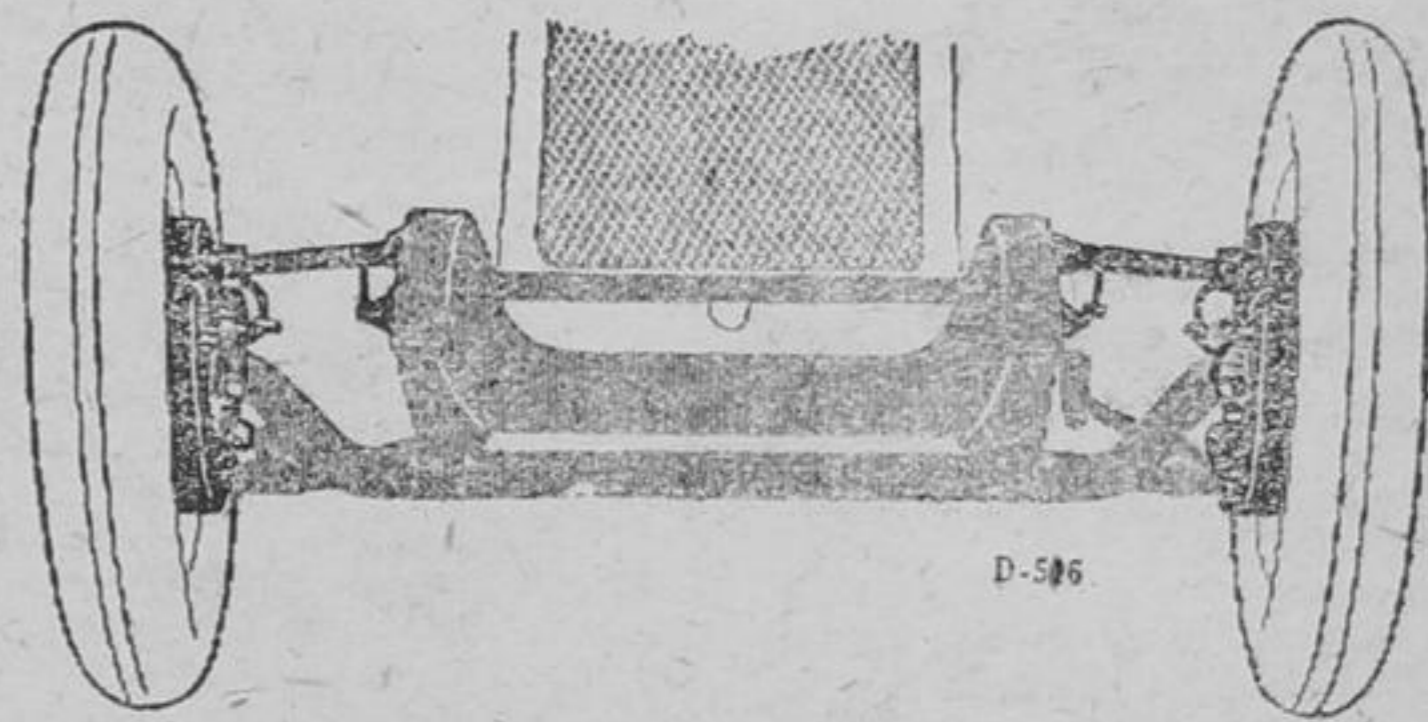
