Whereas the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill deems it advisable to submit to the ratepayers of the said Village entitled to vote on money by-laws a question as to whether the said ratepayers are in favor of a supply of electric power from the Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario.

Therefore, the Council of the Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill enacts as follows—

1. That the following question be submitted to the ratepayers of the Municipal Corporation of the Village of Richmond Hill, who are entitled to vote on money by-laws, "Are you in favor of obtaining from the Hydro-Electric Commission of Ontario, a supply of electric power.

2. That the votes of the said ratepayers shall be taken on this question on the 15th day of June 1925, from 9 o'clock in the morning, until 5 o'clock in the afternoon, in the Masonic Hall in the Village of Richmond Hill.

2. That the votes of the said residents of Richmond Hill shall be taken on this question on the 15th day of June 1925, from 9 o'clock in the morning to 5 o'clock in the afternoon in the Masonic Hall in the Village of Richmond Hill.

3. A true copy of this by-law shall be published in the Richmond Hill "Liberal" on the following days, viz: Thursday, May 21, Thursday, May 28, and Thursday, June 4, and a copy of this by-law shall be posted in four of the most public places in the said Village of Richmond Hill.

4.
