Obituary

Robert Bruce Hendry, aged 8 years, 1 month and 13 days, son of Robert and Annie Hendry of Pine Grove, died on December 1. The funeral was held December 8, to Woodbridge Cemetery.

At Collingwood, Ont., on November 17, Miss Christina Campbell died in her 88th year. Miss Campbell was an old and highly esteemed citizen of Richmond Hill, where she kept a ladies' school, and taught music, and was the organist of St. Mary's Anglican Church for 20 years.

The death took place at Woodstock, on November 28, after an illness of a week's duration, of James B. Munday, a well-known employee of the C.P.R. Mr. Munday was born at Patterson, near Richmond Hill, but went to Woodstock 40 years ago with the Patterson Co. He was unmarried and a member of Chalmers United Church. The only surviving relatives are the following cousins: Mrs. John Riley, Kingston; Miss N. Munday and Mrs. R. Simpson, of Thornhill; and Mr. T. B. Munday, of Toronto. Interment took place last Monday, at the Methodist Cemetery at Woodstock.

Imperial Bank Has Good Year

The gradual improvement in business is reflected in the 51st Annual Report of the Imperial Bank of Canada presented to the shareholders at the Annual Meeting held at the Head Office in Toronto on Wednesday last.
