Mr. Hume in a few introductory remarks dealt analytically with the Treasurer's Statement for the present year, pointing out the heavy debenture payments now being borne by the village and sounding a word of warning of the need to keep a sharp watch on expenditures.

review of the work of the Council this year, citing the fact that 670 feet of walk had been laid. The North Yonge Street sewer had been constructed, relieving the dwellers in that section of much annoyance and damage. The expenditure upon the new fire truck had increased the security of the whole village and had obviated the necessity of building new mains at a cost probably in excess of that of the truck.
