DAYLIGHT SAVING

Richmond Hill will officially adopt Daylight Saving on May 29. Already several citizens are operating on the new time and it will be a relief to many doing business when all people in the community are going by the same clock. It has been said that nothing is finally settled until it is settled right, and this seems to apply to this question whose discussion every spring is as regular of late years as the coming of May flowers. The idea of tinkering with the clock "To save daylight" first found definite form in England during the war years. The innovation spread practically to all the civilized world but, it has apparently never met with unanimous approval anywhere, and especially in rural districts has been unpopular. It quite clearly is of no apparent benefit, and is not wanted by the farmers. 


