A few minutes would not make any difference in the most of cases, as far as business is concerned, but it certainly would make a lot of difference as far as safety is concerned. "Way Back in the Liberal Files"

From the issue, Thursday, May 30, 1901

Richmond Hill Fair was held on Monday, May 24, but the attendance was disappointing as it rained during the day and the grounds were very wet and muddy. But notwithstanding the rain there was a large entry of horses, cattle, poultry and other exhibits. The speeding was called off on account of the muddy track. Newmarket citizens band provided the music. The prize list about \$400 was paid in full although the receipts did not nearly cover the expenditures.

From our issue, May 31, 1903

The annual fair this year was a very successful event. The weather was ideal and there was a good crowd in attendance. In addition to the showing of live stock three teams took part in a foot ball tournament in which Aurora won the prize of \$22.

The band of the Governor General's Body Guard gave a programme during the afternoon. The Liberal reports that the crowd would doubtless have been larger had not a report been circulated that owing to local option the accommodation for visitors would be poor.

From our issue of May 28, 1896

The annual fair this year of the Richmond Hill and Yonge Street Agricultural Society as it was then known was a decided success. The weather was somewhat threatening and therefore the crowd was not as large as it might otherwise have been. There was a football competition which was won by Elmhurst. The display of live stock and fancy work was of very good quality. There was a splendid concert in the hall in the evening the proceeds of which amounted to about \$175. Frank Denton acted as chairman.

Returned Men Of This District To Hold Meeting

As members of the C.E.F. began to return to Canada in numbers during the later war years they found themselves upon discharge faced with the problem of re-establishment in civil life. This led to the forming of ex-soldier organizations. Following the general demobilization, however, it was found there were large bodies of ex-soldiers with their own peculiar problems, and as a consequence numerous organizations were formed, each representing their factions, such as the Amputation, the Tuberculous, the Pensioners, etc.

During the last few years it has become glaringly evident that a great deal of overlapping has been obtaining in the handling of ex-soldiers' affairs, and it was felt if one organization could speak as representing all ex-soldiers this would be much more desirable.

The occasion of Field Marshal Earl Haig's visit to this Dominion was seized upon by that outstanding soldier during his coast to coast tour by an appeal to all ex-soldiers and existing ex-soldier organizations to merge into one organization. Conferences of delegates, representing all classes of ex-soldiers, and all existing organizations, were held in Ottawa and in Winnipeg in July and November respectively last year, and as a result it was decided to bring into being an organization known as the Canadian Legion, which organization it is intended shall represent all ex-soldiers. Practically every Province except Ontario has held its Provincial Convention and established "The Legion"

Provincially. Arrangements are now complete, however, for the holding of Ontario's Convention on June 3rd, 4th and 5th, at the Cronyn Hall, St. Paul's Cathedral, London, Ont., when duly accredited delegates from all branches of existing Ex-Soldier Organizations and representatives of groups of unattached ex-service men are requested to be in attendance.

A meeting of all ex-service men in this district is called for Saturday night when plans for representation at the convention will be made.

Anniversary At St. John's Church

The anniversary services under the auspices of the Ladies' Aid of St. John's United Church were held on Sunday last and were largely attended. The morning service was in charge of Rev. I. G. Bowles of Yonge Street United Church and in the evening Rev. W. E. Wilson of King Street United Church occupied the pulpit. Eloquent and inspiring sermons were given by both these outstanding ministers of the church.

Special music was a feature of the services and added much to the success of the day. At the morning service the choir under Adelmo Melecci rendered an anthem and a pleasing solo was given by Mr. Lauder Glass. In the evening there were two anthems by the choir.
