### OUR HIGHWAYS

The Department of Highways for Ontario commences in this issue a series of advertisements drawing attention to the good roads in the Province and making an appeal for same use of them by the general public.

Highways are now familiar sights in every province and it is recognized that motor-ways are necessary for the accommodation of motor traffic. Hence there has been during the past few years on the part of Provincial legislatures splendid achievement in highway making to the credit of every province in the Dominion.

Advance, with caution and due regard for the future has been the watchword. This attitude has resulted in the building of real highways, though as yet largely unopened, of generous dimensions, wide, straight, elevated at curves, well drained and with fair surface conditions.

In 1914 the number of motor vehicles registered in Canada was 69,547 and in 1925 it was over 10 times as many. With this large increase in motor traffic our highway problem is of necessity a very important one and it is the duty of every motorist and citizen to co-operate with those in charge of the administration of our roads. Let us always remember that the highways represent an immense investment of the people's money and use them and care for them as we would our own personal property.

**NEWSPAPER ADVERTISING**  
Newspaper publicity excels all other forms of advertising. Within certain limits all kinds of publicity may be said to be desirable but is generally conceded to-day that newspaper space is the acme of salesmanship. Probably the most aggressive competitor of the newspaper is the bill board. This method does not permit more than the name of the article being displayed boldly. This makes a proper and carefully considered educational campaign impossible. The strongest argument, however, against this form of publicity is the fact that it is contrary to public opinion. There is an ever growing sentiment against the defacing of scenery. It is not likely to be conducive to the popularity of an advertiser to have his advertisement stand between a motorist or a passenger on the train and a beautiful landscape. About the utmost the bill-board advertiser can hope to accomplish is to emphasize the name or brand of the article he offers for sale upon the mind of a person who has already become fairly familiar with the advertisement. Even those who see the announcement do so only in a passing moment as they are hurrying along the highway and are not then in a frame of mind to be favorably impressed.

There are numerous forms of publicity—but the advertiser who tries them all usually comes back to the root and trunk of successful publicity—the newspaper. The medium that goes into the home as a friendly visitor every week and is read successively by father, mother and children and day after day and is consulted as a reference on all subjects is not easily excelled as a selling agency. ### Prize Essay In York Sites Contest

David's Temple is situated in Sharon. In 1825 the building was started (and was finished in 1842) by the late David Willson, Founder of the "Children of Peace,"—the oldest religious band in North America. He constructed it, thinking God told him too.

The building is square shaped because he wanted to deal square with the people. There are three storeys receding; the top being the tower and in this is a gilded ball with the word "Peace" inscribed on it. He built the Temple without a nail. It is seventy-five feet high and the bottom storey is 60 feet square.

There are 2,952 panes of glass in the windows and spires. The first Saturday in June and September a candle was lit in each window. This light represented the light coming in the minds of Christians.

The first floor was the Auditorium; second floor a music gallery; and the third floor was a dome.

In the centre on the first floor stands a small, finely-finished structure, built by the late John Doan, called the "Altar" and occupied 365 days in building. Like the "Temple" it is square and contains the Holy Bible. It stands on twelve pillars representing the twelve apostles. The glass temple represented the "Ark" the Israelites carried over the desert.

There is a pillar in each corner of the temple with the inscription Faith, Hope, Love, Charity. On the four corners of the three storeys stands a spire. These twelve spires represented the twelve apostles going out to preach.

There are four doors, one on each side and this represented the people coming from all directions to Christ.

The property and temple is now owned by the York Pioneer's Historical Society, who use the building as a museum for storing of old relics and the yard as a park.

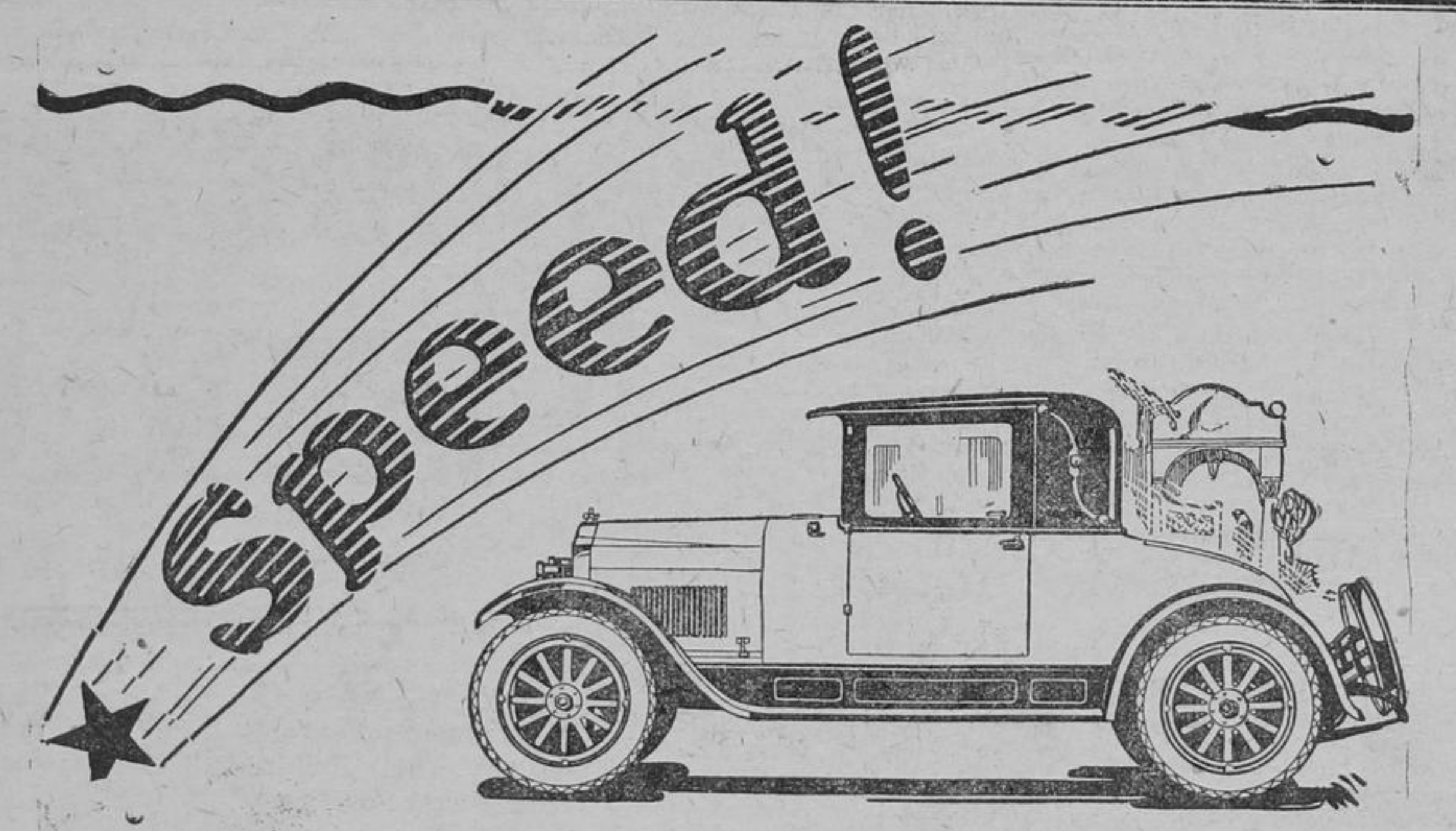
