

Cameron Clan Held Re-Union

Large gathering of descendants of pioneer family at Vellore

Thursday June 3 was the occasion of a unique event when about 250 members of the "Cameron Clan" gathered at Vellore for a family re-union. The gathering was made up of descendants of the late Donald, Archibald, William and Hector Cameron who came to Canada about 1824, and included many from distant points. Members of the family from Regina, Owen Sound, London, Glenora, Toronto and many who are now living in Vaughan and neighboring townships were in attendance. Mr. and Mrs. James McLean and their son and daughter James and Isobell of Richmond Hill were present, Mrs. McLean being a great granddaughter of the late Donald Cameron.

The late Donald Cameron who of all the brothers has the largest number of descendants in this district on his arrival in Canada first settled in Caledon and with the endurance characteristic of his race fought bravely against the privations of pioneer life. In his memoirs which were published after his death in 1858 is told a tale of indomitable courage in the face of almost insurmountable difficulties.

The oldest person at the re-union was Mrs. Flora Malloy of King who is in her eighty second year. There was an extensive program of sports in the afternoon and dinner and supper were served. An interesting feature was the reading of the family history by A. Cameron MacNaughton of Toronto who acted as secretary for the organization of the event. Another enjoyable number was a scottish dance by A. Bryson of Vaughan and Peter McCallum of Chatsworth. It was decided to hold the re-union again next year at the same place and the members are already planning for the day.
