- 2—Name and address of contestant and exact description of the scene illustrated must be clearly written on the back of each photo submitted.
- 3—All entries should be carefully wrapped to avoid damage in the mails.
- 4—It is not necessary to mount photos. Any finishes may be submitted, although black and white, ferrotype or gloss finishes are best for reproduction purposes.
- 5—Photographs of photographs are just as acceptable as original photographs.
- 6—All photographs submitted become the property of The Liberal Printing Company, Limited, whether awarded prizes or not, and may be used by them in any way desired without further recompense.

At The Theatre

Reginald Denny in
"Rolling Home"

What young man has never dreamed of returning to the old home town in a limousine and a fortune at his command, to be welcomed by the cheering villagers?

It is doubtful if any enthusiastic youth ever set forth to wrest wealth and fame from the universe without the mental reservation that he would return and show the home folk they had not appreciated his exceptional talents.

This distinctly human trait provides the basis for the plot of "Rolling Home," William A. Seiter's latest Universal production starring Reginald Denny, which comes to the Capitol theatre Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, July 26, 27, 28.

Denny plays the role of the ambitious wanderer who strays from "Lower Falls" to conquer the world and shame the Rockefellers and Morgans with his business sagacity and financial wizardry.

Like most young men who had hopes but few plans, he discovers that the world is somewhat reluctant to turn over its riches to him without something in return, and the events which follow his departure from home, with his subsequent return, provides excellent comedy of the usual Denny Seiter quality.

SOIL NOTES.

Our Soils Will East.

Soils do not permanently deteriorate—crop yields tend to take a level, high or low, depending upon the recuperative power of the soil and the fertility program followed.

A supply of lime carbonate in the soil is essential to the maintenance of a high level of crop production.

The value of animal manures in the maintenance of soil fertility is measured by the quantity of the fertilizing constituents which they carry and does not depend upon the organic matter supplied to the soil.

Crop yields may be maintained at a high level in a grain system of farming provided proper use is made of the crop residues, a legume crop ploughed down once in four years and reasonable quantities of phosphates and lime applied.

Five thousand five hundred and eighty-four legume cultures, and twenty-one lactic cultures were prepared and sold to farmers and dairymen applying for them by the Bacteriological Dept., O. A. College.

Extravagant Use of Straw.

The use of at least a limited amount of bedding for beef cattle is advisable, but the extravagant use of straw, coarse hays, etc., for this purpose should be discouraged. All such roughages that are to be used for bedding, either for fattening or breeding animals, should first be offered them in the hay rack and that which is refused used for bedding. If stover is fed the stalks, while somewhat difficult to handle, make satisfactory bedding material and should be used for this purpose rather than burned or otherwise disposed of.
