Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Pugsley Honored On Golden Wedding Day.

Prominent in the Life of this Community for Half a
Century Popular Couple Receive Congratulations
on Fiftieth Wedding Anniversary.

A social event of more than ordinary interest took place here on Monday when Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Pugsley were at home to their host of friends at their residence, Elmwood, Arnold St. from three to five in the afternoon, and from seven to ten in the evening and over two hundred called to extend congratulations and best wishes to the happy couple on their golden wedding day.

"Elmwood" was tastefully and appropriately decorated for the occasion with a profusion of flowers, and in the tea room yellow candle sticks tied with yellow ribbon were in keeping with the golden anniversary. Mr. and Mrs. Pugsley received together, Mrs. Pugsley wearing a rosewood silk gown stitched with pearl beads and a triple necklace of pearls and carrying an exquisite bouquet of golden roses. Lady Hearst, wife of Sir William Hearst, former Premier of Ontario and Mrs. W. A. Hall of Toronto poured tea. Mrs. Marsnall, Mrs. McClellan, Miss Mona Pugsley, Miss Phyllis Glass, and Miss Lenore Glass assisted in the tea room, and Miss Olive Switzer looked after the registration of guests.

Many beautiful and costly gifts were received by both Mr. and Mrs. Pugsley which included a purse of gold, a life membership badge for Mrs. Pugsley from the Women's Auxiliary of St. Mary's Church and a beautiful floral offering of fifty roses. In addition to the many who called a large number of telegrams and messages of best wishes were received from all parts of Canada from friends who were unable to attend.

Mr. and Mrs. Pugsley were united in marriage at the town of Newmarket on Sept. 20, 1876, Rev. Tremayne being the officiating clergyman. It is a unique fact that Mr. and Mrs. Henry Cane of Newmarket were married on the same day, journeyed to Toronto after the wedding on the same train, registered at the same hotel and they also celebrated their fiftieth anniversary on Monday. A feature of the celebration was the presence of Major Tremayne and son Jack of Toronto, grandson and great-grandson respectively of the officiating clergyman of fifty years ago. Mrs. F. A. Gady of Toronto, sister of Mr. Pugsley and bridesmaid of fifty years ago was present.

The presentation of a life membership in the Women's Auxiliary was made by Mrs. Rev. H. F. Battersby and Mrs. Pugsley replied in a suitable manner to the following address:

Dear Mrs. Pugsley:—
On this fiftieth Anniversary of your marriage we, the members of our branch of the Women's Auxiliary of St. Mary's, Richmond Hill, desire to unite with us in our work for Christ in striving to further the cause of missions, Sarah Alma Pugsley as a Life Member. Receive this Badge of Life Membership in the Women's Auxiliary and wear it as a memorial of that love and zeal with which we are called to labor in the service of our Master, Jesus Christ. For long and faithful service, signed, A. J. Battersby, President.

A presentation was also made and a suitable address read on behalf of the members of the family by Reeve A. E. Pugsley of Sutton who is a brother of Mr. W. H. Pugsley.

Mrs. Pugsley who was Sarah Alma Atkinson is of U. E. L. stock and has lived in Richmond Hill since she was twelve years of age. Since her marriage fifty years ago she has been prominent in many social activities being an active worker in St. Mary's Anglican Church and is president of the Ladies Conservative organization.

Mr. Pugsley was born in Devonshire, England in 1853 and came to Canada in 1870. Almost immediately after his arrival in this country he settled in Richmond Hill and took up the cattle business in which he has been actively engaged during his lifetime. He went to western Canada in the days of early development and visited several of the Western cities before the arrival of the railway. He took up land there and to-day has considerable interest in that section of the Dominion.

Mr. Pugsley has always been active in the public life of the community. He was a member of the Richmond Hill council and Reeve for nearly half a century, was warden of the County of York in 1891, was a pioneer in the matter of good roads in the Province of Ontario, being a past president of the Ontario Good Roads Association and still an active member of that body. He is widely recognized as an authority on matters municipal and his advice is freely sought in all sections of the Province. He was one of the first members of the Toronto and York Roads Commission and has been delegated to visit various parts of Canada and United States in the interests of good roads. He is a staunch conservative and has always been active in the organization of the party. His life has been one devoted not only to his own interests but he has given of his time, energy and ability to many lines of public endeavour. He is now seventy three years of age but is still active and enjoying the best of health and the Liberal joins with the people of this district in expressing the wish that he and Mrs. Pugsley may be long spared to continue their activity in this community and that the remainder of their lives may be richly blessed with health and happiness and prosperity.

Sustained Painful Injuries
Thomas Jack, aged 50 years, of Orkiole, operator at the North York waterworks pump-house, was struck by a motor car Tuesday evening at Stop 5 Yonge St. and suffered a broken leg, wrist and head injuries. Mr. Jack was about to step on a southbound radial car when the accident occurred, and was struck by the motor car travelling northerly. He was attended by Dr. Humphrey, of Lansing, and later removed to the ex-ray hospital on Bloor street. His condition this morning is reported as favorable and it is expected that he will recover.

Esteemed Citizen Called By Death.

Late John Sliney
The community was shocked on Tuesday night to learn that John Sliney a life-long resident and highly respected citizen of this district had passed away as a result of injuries received when his auto was struck by a radial car. The unfortunate accident which resulted in the fatality occurred about 6.30 and the deceased passed away about two hours afterwards. He was returning from his farm in Vaughan township and in turning in his own driveway on Yonge Street was struck by a northbound car. The auto was completely wrecked and when Mr. Sliney was removed to the office of Dr. Langstaff he was in an unconscious condition. He regained consciousness, however, and for a time recognized friends and members of the family but in spite of all medical aid he died about nine o'clock. Whether he did not see the car, or misjudged the distance or speed in only a matter of conjecture.

The deceased who was in his seventieth year had been a resident of this district all his life and was held in high esteem by all who knew him. He was affable and possessed of a pleasing personality which endeared him to a large circle of friends who sincerely mourn his sudden death. He was a faithful and devoted member of St. Mary's Catholic church and was a staunch Liberal in politics. He is survived by two sons and two daughters. Edward at home, William in Buffalo, Mrs. Gibbons and Mrs. De Ferrari of Richmond Hill.

The funeral services will be held at St. Mary's Catholic Church on Friday morning September 24 at ten o'clock and will be in charge of Father Kelly. Interment will follow at Thornhill cemetery.
