Kleinburg Asks Council for Lights

Regular Session Vaughan Council.
The regular meeting of the Vaughan township council was held in the township hall Vellore on Monday afternoon with Reeve Weldrick in the chair and all members present. A strong deputation was present from Kleinburg and Nashville relative to the lighting of the streets of the villages. It was pointed out that Maple was lighted and the cost borne by the township as a whole and it was felt that all centres should be treated alike. The petitioners voiced no objection to Maple having lights at the expense of the whole township, but only asked that the same system be adopted in Kleinburg and Nashville. It was argued that it was not the residents of the village who received the most benefit but rather the general travelling public and that therefore the cost should be borne by the township as a whole. A petition was presented asking that the council request the hydro to submit an estimate on the cost of installation and operation of a street lighting system in Kleinburg. It was signed by, J. Deputy-reeve Kellam took exception to the statement that nothing had been done and he explained that the council had carefully considered the matter and had taken it up with the Hydro. The Hydro commissioners advised that the township would be within the law in paying a portion of the cost of the lights for a hamlet but no place in the province of Ontario had the municipality shared the entire burden without a certain portion being paid by those directly served. Deputy-reeve Kellam mentioned the case of the township of North York where the lighting on Yonge Street was paid on an eighty and twenty per cent. basis. After carefully considering the matter it was the opinion of the members that Vaughan would be willing to pay 20 per cent. of the cost if the people served would be willing to pay 80 per cent. He had personally advised certain petitioners to this effect.

George Arnold, Nashville, G. W. East and Dr. Robinson of Kleinburg also spoke in favor of the petition and urged that it should be treated as a township matter rather than make it necessary for the people of the respective villages to pay eighty per cent.

The council decided to forward the petition from Kleinburg to the Hydro Commission for a report. A similar petition will have to come from Nashville, if any action is desired as in the previous one no area was defined and it was not in order.

James Stewart of the second concession was paid \$170 for thirteen sheep killed by dogs. Mr. Stewart complained that there was no allowance for damage to the flock which he considered was just as great as from the ones actually killed. Reeve Weldrick stated that he appreciated his argument but that the law did not make any such provision and that the council had to go by the statutes. Mr. Ryder and members of the council also pointed out that the appointment of permanent sheep valuers was under consideration.

The usual grant of \$25.00 was made to the King and Vaughan Plowmen's Association. Mr. and Mrs. L. Clement of Thornhill with their solicitor Mr. Creighton appeared relative to the claim of Mr. Clement for payment of damages as a result of injuries sustained last year while driving on the Concord Road. The council will take the matter up with the insurance company.

Council Favors Organization of Ratepayers Association

For the purpose of organizing a Ratepayers' Association in Richmond Hill a Public Meeting will be held in the Council Chambers on Monday, November 18th. The proposed Association will be entirely a citizens' organization and the council are merely taking the first step of providing the opportunity of organization. The functions of the proposed body will not be limited by any statute or charter and the good which may be accomplished is limited only by the measure in which citizens support the project. The apparent duties of the organization will be the industrial, social and business life of the community. Every citizen who is interested in the advancement of the town should make a special effort to attend and should from now until November 18th be a personal missionary for the success of the meeting.

A real live meeting of the Richmond Hill council was held in the Clerk's office on Monday night when a serious and thoughtful discussion of local problems took place. It was the opinion of all members of the council that there were a great many things which could be done to promote the welfare of the community, but it was felt that many of them could best be handled by a citizen's or ratepayer's organization and accordingly steps were taken for the organization of such a body. The matter was introduced by Councillor Greene who said that there was a feeling among a large body of citizens that the village was not aggressive enough in the matter of advertising and attracting people to come to Richmond Hill. Prof. Walker who was present expressed himself as favorable to a citizen's organization which would meet from time to time to consider the questions of interest to the town. He said he appreciated the fact that the average ratepayer was very much inclined to leave all the Town's business to the members of the council but he did not think that such an attitude was entirely fair. The council had the various departments to look after and administer and thought that the whole body of citizens who make up the community should take an active interest in the welfare of the place in which they live. He was confident that a live ratepayers association could do much work in advertising and publicity work.

Someone suggested that we already had a ratepayers association and a Board of Trade. This was apparently too much for Councillor Sloan who declared that the latter body was DEAD. He was a member but never attended as nothing was ever done.

Councillor Greene pointed out that the Board of Trade had done some very good work but had not been active in recent months. The rate payers association had apparently petered out and should be revived and the only way was for the Reeve to call a meeting.

On motion of Councillors Greene and Ballock it was decided to call a citizens meeting and the date was fixed on Monday November 15th.

Reeve Lunan reported that he had attended a conference of the municipalities served by the Metropolitan radial, and the city of Toronto on Thursday last. Several proposals were made by the City representatives as to the joint operation of the road, the taking over of the road by the municipalities served and other alterations but no definite action was taken.

The members of the council were unanimously of the opinion that better radial service at lower rates was of vital importance to Richmond Hill. Councillor Greene said that what he needed was a cheaper fare and stated that over one hundred families moved to Toronto when the increase was made because they could not afford to pay it. "If we want more people in Richmond Hill we must have a cheaper fare," he said.

Councillor Sloan thought the present mode of travel was dear at any price. "Imagine," he said "thirty-five minutes to go nine miles, when it should only take about twenty minutes. I wish the Kaiser no worse fate than to have to ride up and down on that radial. The best service we ever had was when the "limited" cars stopping only at Thornhill were run. What we need is a rapid service."

Councillor Ballock thought that the line could be made to pay if Richmond Hill were made the terminal. It was the upper end of the line which was the white elephant.

Councillor Herrington wanted to know when, if anything was to be done about a sidewalk on Benson Avenue this year. The Reeve advised that cinders would be put down as soon as the town workmen had an opportunity. The wet weather had been a great handicap in getting work done he said.

The tenders for supplying gravel for the streets were opened and contract let for 200 yards at \$1.99 per yard to L. B. Stong, 100 yards at \$2.00 per yard to De Ferrari and Sliney and 100 yards at \$2.00 per yard to B. F. Caldwell. Other tenders were—J. Helmkey \$2.00 per yard, R. Tyndall and C. Mandy, \$2 per yard; J. Sheardown \$2.05 for gravel from the Maple pit and \$2.25 for gravel from Wilcox Lake.

The matter of the increase in the Hydro commercial rates was discussed at some length. Chairman Greene of the lighting committee pointed out that a conference with the commission had not as yet resulted in anything definite but another would be held very shortly when certain suggestions would be made as to lowering the rate and adjusting the basis of charges which he felt sure would be acceptable to the Hydro. It was pointed out that according to the agreement of the municipality with the Hydro, the commission are empowered by statute to dictate rates and methods of billing but on the other hand the commission are always glad of suggestions from the municipality and as far as possible carry them out. On motion of Councillors Greene and Ballock it was decided to bill the commercial users for the months of September and October on the former schedule until the matter is finally settled by the commission.

Producers of North York Farm Organization

Monday night last the producers using the York Market organized under the name of the North York Producers Association with Mr. J. H. Young as President, R. Pool, Sec'y, treasurer and a committee of Messrs. Herdman, Pinder, Thornton, Taylor A. Lund and Privett. The fee is one dollar and all producers of York County may be members.

Liberal-Temperance Convention In Woodbridge on Wednesday Next
