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## Enthusiastic Meeting Decides to Make Organized Effort to Boost Town

Will Advertise Richmond Hill as Toronto's Highest and Healthiest Suburb and an Ideal Industrial Centre.

At a largely attended citizen meeting held in the Council Chamber on Monday night the Richmond Hill Ratepayers' Association was re-organized. The purpose of the new organization as roughly outlined by the meeting will be to promote the social, industrial and business welfare of the town and among the problems mentioned at the meeting for the consideration of the members were: transportation facilities, industrial development, town beautification and a publicity campaign to attract more residents. Many other matters of interest to the general welfare of the village will be discussed at future meetings and an organized effort will be made to further the interests of the citizens. The activities of the association will not be limited and the sphere of its work will be as broad as the needs of the ratepayers demand. Every ratepayer is a member and no membership fee will be charged as it was the feeling of the meeting that not even the membership should be limited in any way. It is hoped through the medium of this organization to effectively advertise Richmond Hill as Toronto's Highest and Healthiest suburb as an ideal residential and industrial centre.

Reeve Lunau duly presided as chairman and in his introductory remarks explained that the Council felt that the presence of a ratepayers organization was an asset to the town and a great help to the Council. The Council were also active working in the best interests of the ratepayers but they were busy with matters of administration and would always be glad of suggestion from such a body as proposed and would most certainly seriously consider any suggestions or requests from such an organization. The first order of business called by chairman was the election of officers which resulted as follows:—President W. Thompson; Vice-president, F. J. Mansbridge; Sec. Treas. J. E. Smith; Executive Committee, Mrs. A. A. Perry, Miss Brown, T. Trench, Wm. Davies, Prof. Walker, G. H. Duncan, H. Innes, Rev. J. W. McIntosh, N. Batty, H. E. Wray, David Hill, W. Hall.

It was pointed out that the executive would draft committees from the executive named and would report at the next meeting. A constitution outlining the aims of the organization and by-laws governing procedure will also be drawn up and presented to the next meeting for approval.

Councillor G. H. Sloan advised the meeting that he had correspondence with a large American manufacturing concern which was going to locate a branch in Canada. A building with about 15,000 square feet of floor space was required and that on investigation he found that the largest available building in the village was about 12,000 square feet. It was moved by Councillor J. A. Greene seconded by N. Batty and carried unanimously that Mr. Sloan follow up his correspondence with the firm and assure them that Richmond Hill would be glad to meet them and discuss the matter of locating here.

The meeting adjourned to meet at the call of the president.

## County Council to Meet on Monday

Will Probably adjourn on Account of  
Provincial Election.

The York County Council is called for Nov. 22nd at 3 o'clock but due to the fact that Warden P. W. Pearson is the Liberal candidate in North York it is expected that after communications are read the council will adjourn until Tuesday, December 7th as Monday, December 6th is township council day in at least five townships. The warden is not the only County Councillor taking an active part in this campaign.

The metropolitan school area committee may report but it is probable that nothing new will result. The County Council can never describe the area. That duty will have to be undertaken by the Minister of Education.

Deputy Reeve Westbury of York may introduce a motion to apply for legislation to give certain southern townships a fixed county assessment. If the motion comes up there will be spirited opposition as it is felt that if these townships wish to remain in the County and thus secure road and schools grants they should be willing to accept their fair county assessment.

Markets in the east and west will also be a matter of discussion, but the unqualified success of the North York Market has paved the way for the east and west.

Reeve R. F. Hicks and Reeve W. C. Gohn are expected to be able to, from their experience in the north, give valuable information to the County Council on this matter.

## Lord and Lady Willingdon Welcomed in Richmond Hill

His Excellency, Lord Willingdon, Governor-General of Canada and Lady Willingdon were tendered a civic reception here this morning. The vice-regal representatives were officially received by Reeve Lunau and members of the Town Council in the presence of a large crowd of citizens and the children of the High and Public Schools. Their Excellencies inspected the War Memorial and stood while all the school children walked past. A beautiful bouquet of flowers was presented to Lady Willingdon by little Miss Elsie Ley of the public school and was graciously acknowledged.

The Governor-General and party arrived by motor at eleven and were given a welcome fitting the official representatives of His Majesty the King despite the fact that the arrangements had to be made in a very short time. Many more citizens would have welcomed the opportunity to see the Governor-General but as it was not known till late this morning that the village would be honored by the visit it was impossible to further advertise the function.

His Excellency expressed pleasure on paying a visit to Richmond Hill which was visited by one of his predecessors the Duke of Richmond, in 1819. The vice-regal party departed amidst three rousing British cheers by the assembled citizens and school children.
