YORK BOYS WON WON PRIZE AT GUELPH

HENRY HAD A LARGE MAJORITY

Hon. Geo. S. Henry won a decisive
victory over Levi Annis, Liberal-Pro-
hibitionist in East York on Wednes-
day, having a majority of about six
thousand. The north end of the rid-
ing in many places gave substantial
majorities against the government
but they were small in comparison to
the votes piled up in more thickly
populated sections.

Mr. Annis conducted a very credit-
able campaign and the same can be
said for the member-elect. The con-
test in East York was not marred by
many of the objectionable features
noticeable elsewhere. The prohibition
candidate entered the fight at a late
hour in the campaign and considering
the odds against him polled a good
vote which is a tribute to the per-
sonal character of the candidate.
Mr. Henry has represented the riding
for a number of years and his vic-
tory is evidence of the unwavering
confidence of the electors.

Richmond Hill gave a majority of
84 to Annis out of a total vote of
560. A detailed account of the results
will be published next week as it was
impossible to secure official figures at
the time of going to press.

Conservatives Won Decisive Victory In The Province

Ontario has spoken at the polls
and in no uncertain manner has re-
newed the mandate of Hon. G. How-
ard Ferguson and his government.
The Ontario Temperance Act which
was vigorously defended by those who
believed that its retention was in the
best interests of the province has
been turned down in favor of "Some-
thing New." That a general desire
to give some other system a chance
contributed largely to the victory we
have no doubt.

It is said that an old country man
is no good here until he has at least
one trip home. So it may be that the
O. T. A. could not be entirely satis-
factory until we have given some
other system a chance.

All who have the interests of true
temperance at heart will now sincer-
ely hope that the new law will ac-
complish all that has been claimed
for it. If it will banish the Bootleg-
ger, Reduce Drinking and Restore
Respect for Law and Order the el-
ectors will have little to regret.
Time alone will tell and Mr. Fergu-
son and his Government Control will
like all leaders and legislation be
judged by results.

Seventy-five Conservatives, Four-
teen Liberals, ten Progressives four
Liberal-Progressives, One Labor and
one Prohibitionist have been elected
in one of the most strenuously con-
tested elections in history. One of
or two seats are still doubtful.

Toronto as was expected returned
a solid Tory representation. West
South and East York did likewise but
Warden P. W. Pearson won a notable
victory in North York over Wm.
Keith with a majority of about 1,500.

The three leaders, Sinclair, Fergu-
son and Raney are returned, but Nick-
le was badly beaten in Kingston.

The results were received locally
without any marked enthusiasm. The
Liberal telephone was kept busy dur-
ing the evening giving out the latest
results and many heard the returns
by radio. The issue was so definitely
decided that at an early hour it was
conceded that Ferguson would have
a majority over all.

Municipal Elections Will Come Next

Election-Wary Public will Exercise
Municipal Franchise on January 3

The provincial election is over and
now the towns, villages and town-
ships will soon be in the midst of an-
other contest, but this time the issue
be of a more local character. How-
ever the election-wary public must
not weary of well-doing and should
take an active and intelligent interest
in the municipal nominations. The
date of the nomination meeting for
Richmond Hill has been set as Mon-
day, December 27th and if an election
is necessary it will be held on Mon-
day, January 3rd.

patronized the event.

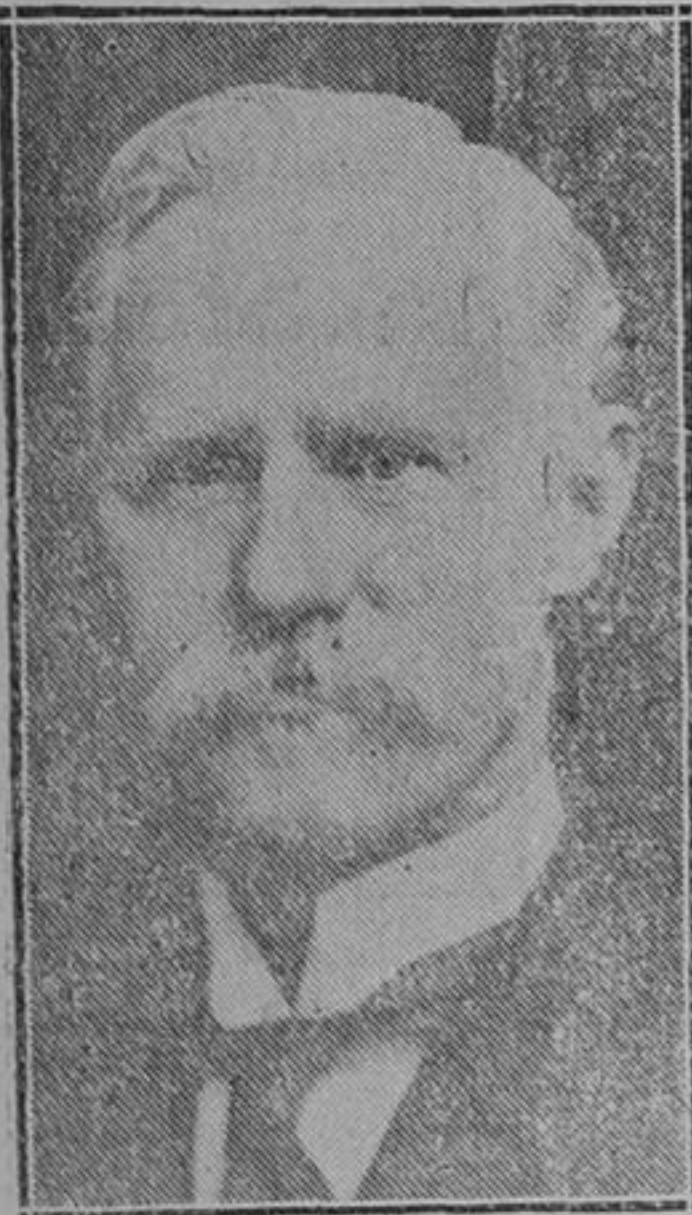
Womens' Institute
