
PROSPECTS FOR ELECTION IN SEVERAL MUNICIPALITIES

Th speech from the throne was read and its adoption moved by Acting Prime Minister J. A. Greene who guided the destinies of the members on the treasury benches in the unavoidable absence of Reeve Lunau. It was seconded by W. G. Baldock and after a few hours debate an amendment censoring the government policy and declaring that the House should go on record as in favor of an intensive campaign to increase the revenues of the village was introduced by the opposition. On the division the Government of the day suffered defeat on the floor of the House by a vote of 6-4. The sensation of the division wasprovided by the Minister of Education who refused to follow his leader on the general policies and voted
