Ratepayers Association will sponsor a candidate to fill the vacancy. The nomination meeting will be held on Monday December 27.

In Vaughan Township Reeve Wedrick has announced that he will be a candidate for re-election and it is possible that he will have an opponent in deputy-reeve George Kellam. This would leave a vacancy which would be filled by other members stepping up and there would be room for one new councillor.

In Newmarket there are spoken of for mayor the present mayor J. E. Nesbit, Harry Doyle with five years' in council and Dr. C. A. Ames a former member of Council. For reeve deputy reeve F. A. Lundy and E. S. Cody.

In North York three will likely contest the reeveship, the present reeve R. F. Hicks and 3rd deputy reeve W. W. Anderson.

For 1st deputy reeve James Muirhead will likely get an acclamation but for 2nd deputy W. W. Carson for two years councillor and Dr. Hamby a new man will battle it out. For 3rd deputy W. G. Scrace who held the position last year and Reuben Phillips of Downsview will be contestants.

In Markham W. C. Gohn will probably get an acclamation but 2nd Deputy reeve Stiver may oppose 1st Deputy reeve John Campbell and councillor Honey step to 2nd deputy reeve.

In King the present Reeve A. MacMurchy will be opposed by former deputy reeve Milton Legge. The balance of the council will likely get an acclamation.

There is every indication of a municipal election in Whitchurch this coming January. Reeve Baker will stand re-election and is likely to be opposed by deputy reeve George Leary. It is also rumored that Councillor Wm. Crawford, who is also an ex-reeve is again out for the reeveship, thus precipitating a three cornered fight.

For the position of deputy reeve the ratepayers are likely to be called upon to vote for Abner Baker or Councillor Herman Kidd. All these men have had considerable municipal experience in the township, and should seek election as indicated above, there will be plenty of room for a new timber in the council.

Reeve Hicks Given Enthusiastic Support In North York

A rousing endorsement was given R. F. Hicks of North York Township at a well attended meeting in the Municipal Hall Willowdale on Saturday evening, December 18th.

The meeting was called for the purpose of organizing and appointing subdivision captains for every polling sub-division.

Mr. Jiles, who occupied the chair spoke at length on the past successful record of the Reeve during his term of office, making special reference to the Incorporation of North York as a township, and the untiring efforts of the Reeve in the administration of Township affairs.

When the Reeve rose to speak he was greeted with loud applause and in his opening remarks stated that he was willing at all times to consult the Ratepayers as to the course to be pursued in the administration of the Township affairs, and that he would go on as in the past, to endeavor to solve the vital problems which come before council, from time to time, after considering them from all angles.

I hope you will agree with me the Reeve stated that our road policy has met with approval and success, and that it is a credit due to my administration that North York is better financially than any other surrounding municipality.

In speaking of his opponent, Mr. W. W. Anderson, the reeve was of the opinion that no man should ever attempt to fill the Reeve's chair if he was unable to attend every session of the council, speaking for himself there was never a day in the year that he was not called upon to do some duty pertaining to Township affairs.

But in the face of this he was at liberty any day and any time to attend to the business of the municipality.

Although he did not think it right to go back on the support received in former years, Mr. Hicks stated that he wished to consult the supporters of last year and that he was man enough to make good on the confidence shown him and the rousing endorsement he had received.

Arrangements were made to hold other meetings throughout the township and a central committee was appointed comprising the following: Messrs. Wm. Darwin, Jiles, Darlington, Perrett, R. J. Woods, Joseph Jackson and Galbraith.
