Is A Tractor For The Farm A Profitable Investment?

It Enables the Farmer to Keep Work Up to date is the Opinion of Majority who have Tried It.

Eighty-five per cent of the farmers in Eastern Canada and British Columbia, who contributed information to the Experimental farm regarding their tractor claimed that it was a profitable investment.

The main reason which was assigned for the profitable showing of the tractor was that it enabled the farmer to keep his work up to date. Over one-half of the farmers gave this as the chief value of the tractor. Keeping the work up to date means, among other things, getting all the fall plowing done in the fall and getting the spring seeding done early in the spring.

The men who did not favor the tractor stated, as their chief objections to this machine, that their farms were not large enough to warrant its use or were too hilly, too sandy or too stony to permit of its economical operation.
