North York Market

There was a touch of St. Patrick's Day at the North York Farmers market on Yonge street north, on Tuesday. Shamrock in pots, grown in the County of York, was offered at 15 cents and 25 cents. Egg prices are still a trifle on the weak side, the market opened at 40 cents a dozen for small pullet eggs, and 45 cents for the medium size, while the large sizes were 50 cents per dozen.

Duck eggs made their appearance at 60 cents per dozen. Vegetables in lots of 6 quart baskets were, Potatoes 25 cents, Carrots 20 cents, Parsnips 25 cents, beets 12 cents and onions 30 cents., Cooking apples, common grade Northern Spies 50 cents. Eating apples, snows 40 cents. The price of apples apparently is declining as the winter season draws to a close. Potatoes could be bought for \$1.10 per bag. Carrots were 75 cents per bushel parsnips were \$1.00 in bushel lots and turnips could be had for 60 cents in bushel quantities. Bushel lots or larger quantities would be delivered. Apples were \$1.00 to \$1.50 in bushel lots and a barrel could be bought from \$3.00 per barrel up for the cooking variety. A number of the farmers who have built up a reputation for quality were asking and selling quite freely potatoes at 40 cents per peck.

Butter stiffened up a few cents per pound at 50 cents. Whipping cream was 40 cents for full pints, while gem jar pints were 35 cents. Plain cream was 25 cents per pint. The bottles were 10 cents extra. Pork was the only kind of meat offered, legs were 28 cents, loins 32 cents and shoulder cuts were 25 cents. Boiling fowl was 35 cents per pound and ordinary roasting fowl was 40 cents with 45 cents being asked for the milk variety. Ducks were offered at 50 cents per pound, but were scarce. Cabbages were 5 and 10 cents per head, turnips were 3 for 10 cents. Fresh greens grown in the greenhouses of York County were green onions 3 bunches for 10 cents, rhubarb small stalks 5 cents bunch, and the large thick stalks of 3 bunches for 25 cents.

A dash of color was added to the market when quantities of cut flowers were offered. Tulips were 50 cents per dozen, and sweet peas 30 cents a bunch. Besides the sham rocks at 15 and 25 cents per pot where roses in bloom in pots at \$1.00 each. Schumdrum were 25 cents a pot, while other potted plants were from this price on up to 60 cents each.
